# **Course objectives**

This course aims to give students a better knowledge of the reasons behind food and agriculture-related government policies, as well as the tools utilized to achieve those goals. We'll talk a lot about how to determine which people benefit and which people suffer from government policies as all policies have winners and losers.

The course's first section presents the reasons for agricultural policies and discusses various instruments that can be employed to focus policy objectives. With a focus on Canadian food and agricultural policies, the second section goes into detail on particular programs. It is expected of students to master the fundamentals of microeconomics.

Programs like AgriStability are examined, but it's crucial to remember that learning the ins and outs of certain government policies is not the main objective of this course. Government policies shift every few years, therefore understanding a particular program is only helpful for a short while. The goal of this course is to give students the skills they need to comprehend and evaluate the financial implications of both present-day and upcoming agriculture policies.

### **Project timeline**

- 1. **Selection of project:** A short overview of your project should be submitted to UMLEARN by **February 16 (by 11:59 PM)**. A maximum one-page (not counting the list of references), single-spaced document in PDF format outlining the project which must include:
  - o Title of the project
  - Specification of the policy that you will be working on in your project
  - The tentative layout of your project. It should encompass a detailed outline that delineates
    the specific tasks, milestones, and objectives you aim to achieve, providing a
    comprehensive overview of the activities and methodologies that will be employed in your
    project.
- 2. **Final report:** should be submitted by **April 8 (by 11:59 PM)**

**Note:** You are prohibited from seeking assistance from any AI tools throughout your project. All submitted work will undergo thorough scrutiny, and any instances of suspicious activity will be subject to the university's plagiarism and cheating policies. AI tools may only be utilized for grammatical corrections.

# **Quizzes**

There will be 6 class quizzes, of which I will count the best 5. Each quiz will be worth 2 marks. Quiz marks will not be transferred to the final, i.e., **Missed quizzes will count as 0**.

### Midterm exam

The midterm exam will be closed-book and held during class time. I will share details as time approaches.

#### Final exam

The final exam will be **2 hours** in length and will be closed-book and invigilated. It will cover all chapters (cumulative). It will consist of two sections: section A will be multiple choice, multi-select, fill-in-the-blank, true/false type questions and section B will be written response questions. I will provide details as the date approaches.
