2024 JET Programme

What is it?

- "Japan Exchange and Teaching (JET) Programme"
- Mission: To promote grass roots level internationalization and improve English language education in local Japanese communities.
- Established in 1987
- As of July 1st, 2023 there were 5831 people from 50 countries participating on the JET Programme
- As of July 1st, 2023 there were 573 Canadians participating on the JET Programme



Structure

- The program is managed by the Council of Local Authorities for International Relations (CLAIR), an agency tasked with fostering grass roots level internationalization in Japan.
- Recruitment and participant selection is carried out by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA) through overseas Embassies and Consulates



For the aspiring JET

Eligibility Criteria

- Strong interest in Japan, Japanese language and culture
- University Graduate (or become one by the departure date)
- Canadian Citizen
- Excellent English skills (both written and spoken)
- Have the ability to adapt to living and working in Japan
- Not have previously been on the program for more than 5 years
- Not have declined a position on the JET Programme or returned from participating on JET the previous year
- Have a desire to proactively maintain relations with Japan even after completion of the Programme



Health-Related Info

- Self Report of Medical Conditions
 - Be upfront
 - Be clear
 - Be consistent
- Statement of Physician submitted with application
 - Needed if you have a condition requiring treatment or prescription meds – OR if you've ever had something in the past <u>5 years</u>
- Certificate of Health submitted after interview results
 - If you develop a new condition after applying, a Statement of Physician will be needed later



ALT (Assistant Language Teacher)

90% of JETs are ALTs

- School Based ALT
 - Elementary School ALT
 - JHS (Junior High School) ALT
 - SHS (Senior High School) ALT
- One-Shot ALT
 - Works for a BOE (Board of Education) -Visits different schools on a rotating basis
- "Team-Teaching"
 - Regular English classes in junior and senior high
 - Elementary school classes
 - Lesson planning
- Foreign language clubs, speech contests
- Assist with other school activities





CIR

(Coordinator for International Relations)

- 10% of JETs are CIRs
- Posted at local government offices (Prefectural, City, Town, or Village Municipal Offices) or related organizations
- Requires Japanese ability to work in an office environment (about JLPT 2)
- Help organize international exchange projects, and initiate new projects in the community
- Community activities (visit senior-citizen centres and schools, plan and assist with local events and festivals, etc.)
- Language classes
- Translation/interpretation
- Writing and editing newsletters and publications
- Sister-city/Economic exchange projects
- Assist foreign diplomats visiting your municipality
- Public speaking





Qualities that make a good JET

- Adaptability
- Initiative
- Creativity
- Humour
- Desire to learn Japanese language and culture
- Desire to teach
- Patience
- Humility



The Details

Working Conditions

- Assigned placement in urban, semi-urban or rural Japan
- One year contract with a Contracting Organization (CO), NOT with "JET Programme" or "CLAIR"
- Possible to renew a contract for a 2nd or 3rd year (in some cases up to a maximum of 5 years)
- 35 hour work weeks
- Typically Monday to Friday, 8:30 16:15 (please check your specific contract)
- Minimum of 10 paid vacation days a year
- Approximately 15 national holidays





Salary & Taxes

- JETs earn approximately CA\$40,000 a year, paid in monthly installments
- You do have to fill out a Canadian tax return, stating your JET income
- Income earned on the JET Programme is exempt from Canadian income tax
- Deductions made for Japanese health insurance, accident insurance & municipal taxes.





Accommodation

- Range from small apartments to your own house
- Generally smaller than is typical in Canada
- Often take over predecessor's place





- CO will help you find a home
- Rent can vary, depending on location
- May need to pay deposit, key money, etc. (can be up to a few months rent)



Support

- Supervisor, colleagues & neighbours
- Friends (other JETs & ex-pats)
- Prefectural advisors
- AJET (peer support groups, nationality groups, special interest groups, etc.)
- JET Hotline (JET Programme Coordinators)
- CLAIR offers correspondence classes for those who want to improve their Japanese language skills
 - Beginner, intermediate and advanced Japanese
 - Translating and interpreting
 - Applied Japanese linguistics/pedagogy



How to Apply

- Application window open starting mid-October
- Create profile at
 <u>www.jetprogramme.ca</u>
- Fill in application form
- Proof of Graduation (degree copy or letter of expected graduation)
- University Transcript
- Statement of Physician (if applicable)
- Proof of citizenship Passport photo copy or birth certificate
- Statement of Purpose Essay Why do you want to be a JET?
- Two letters of reference are required (so don't wait until the last minute)
