The Faculty of Education and the teaching profession: overview

In order to become a classroom teacher in Manitoba you must complete a Bachelor of Education degree, in addition to a prior Bachelors degree.

A Bachelor of Education (BEd) at the University of Manitoba is an after-degree program. It is a two-year program (60 credit hours) which follows the completion of a first degree, and is therefore called an after-degree program.

After-Degree Bachelor of Education programs include: Early Years, Middle Years and Senior Years.

A BEd leads to professional teacher certification by Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning. This certification provides you the opportunity to attain initial employment as a classroom teacher in Manitoba and elsewhere.

Current certification requirements for the Province of Manitoba require 24 weeks of practicum which are completed as part of the 60 credit hours required for the BEd degree.

If you desire a role other than classroom teacher in the education field, you can achieve those professional requirements via the Post Baccalaureate Diploma in Education (PBDE) or graduate degrees in education (MEd or PhD).

Admission requirements

To be eligible for admission to the after-degree BEd program, applicants must have graduated, or be graduating with a recognized bachelor's degree, and have completed their teachable courses and breadth requirement (where applicable) from a recognized institution by May 1 in the year of application. In addition, all coursework presented for teachable major or minor must be at the 1000-level or higher (unless otherwise noted). Courses presented for breadth requirement and for teachable subject areas must come from the specific department unless noted otherwise: i.e. English/ French Literature must have designation ENGL or FREN.

Early and middle years

Your first degree must be a recognized bachelor's degree, consisting of a minimum 90 credit hours. You must also meet the requirements for two different teachable subjects plus a breadth component .*

- Teachable subject credit hours:
- 18 credit hours in a teachable major,
- 12 credit hours in a teachable minor,
- Breadth component credit hours:
- 6 credit hours English Literature or French Literature,
- 6 credit hours Social Studies: History (HIST) or Geography (GEOG),
- 6 credit hours Math: Mathematics (MATH) or Statistics (STAT),
- 6 credit hours Science: Biology (BIOL), Chemistry (CHEM), Physics (PHYS), Geological Science (GEOL) or Environmental Science (ENVR).

* Breadth courses must be fulfilled from their respective departments. For additional breadth coursework, please see the Faculty of Education website: Programs of Study.

Senior years

Your first degree must be a recognized bachelor's degree consisting of a minimum of 90 credit hours. You must also meet the requirements for two different teachable subjects.

- Teachable subject credit hours:
- 30 credit hours in a teachable major,
- 18 credit hours in a teachable minor

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Other requirements for admission to the After-Degree Bachelor of Education program

• Minimum Adjusted Grade Point Average (AGPA) required for consideration is 2.50.

• Minimum grade of C in each teachable major/ minor course and in breadth component coursework, if required.

• 3 references.

Potential applicants in the process of completing their first degree are advised that meeting the teachable major/minor requirements and the breadth coursework for Education may not meet the requirements for a first degree in their home faculty. Applicants are advised to consult their current Faculty chapter of the Undergraduate Calendar. **As admissions requirements change, you MUST check with us annually to ensure you are continuing to meet the requirements.**

Diversity Admission Policy

Completed applications with supporting documents must be submitted by Feb. 1.

Child Abuse Registry and Statement of Criminal Record(s) Self-Declaration

Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning requires that background checks be conducted on all candidates for teacher education in Manitoba and on all applications for certification for this province. Accordingly, all applicants offered admission to Bachelor of Education programs will be required to complete the "Self-Declaration For Newly Admitted Students: Child Abuse Registry and Statement of Criminal Records" as a condition of final acceptance to the program.

In addition to the above self-declaration all successful applicants will be conditionally admitted pending clearance of an official Canadian Criminal Record Search (including Vulnerable Sector Screening) and clearance from the Provincial Child Abuse Registry. Failure to clear or failure to provide these documents by the stated deadline will result in the admission offer being revoked. Forms must be dated March 15 of the intake year or later.

Part-time options

Some opportunities for reducing your courseload are available in all streams. However, reducing your courseload will extend the length of your program.

Note: Some part-time study is available, but day-time attendance is required. You cannot complete the degree by taking online and evening classes, and scheduling-selection is limited. (For more information please see the Faculty of Education *UM Undergraduate Calendar*, *Academic Regulations for All Bachelor of Education Programs*)

Statute of limitation

The maximum time allowed for the completion of the BEd degree is six years from the date of admission.

Your adjusted GPA (AGPA) for Faculty of Education

Your AGPA is calculated using your most recent 30 credit hours of University level coursework completed by February 1st in the year you apply to the Faculty of Education. To calculate your most recent 30 credit hours we will look back term by term until we attain the credit hours required.

Only courses with final grades will be included in your AGPA calculation.

If at the time of application you are completing coursework, that coursework will not be used to calculate your most recent 30 credit hour AGPA. Only coursework with final grades can be included in your AGPA calculation. This includes any courses that may have been repeated.

Note: If within your 'most recent 30 credit hours' you took a class, and received a D grade, then repeated the same class and received a C+ grade, both the D and the C+ grades will be used to calculate your AGPA.

Note: Confirm with current Applicant Bulletin for information pertaining to grades obtained during Winter 2020, Summer 2020, Fall 2020, Winter 2021, and Summer 2021.

Courses graded 'Satisfactory' and 'Pass': See current Applications Bulletin for further information.

Courses graded 'F' or 'Fail' will be included in the AGPA calculation using a numeric grade point value of 0.0.

Teachable major and/or minor coursework being completed in Winter Term, in the year of application, will be reviewed in April. The review in April confirms that your final major and/or minor, and/or breadth coursework grades have met the requirement of a C grade or better.

AGPA minimum

In recent years, the admission process has been increasingly competitive and therefore, applicants should strive for an AGPA higher than the minimum 2.50 required.
