ARTS ENDOWMENT FUND

The Faculty of Arts Endowment Fund is to help support the advancement and enrichment of the teaching, research and scholarly goals of the Faculty of Arts. The income from the fund is to be used for activities or projects which are not normally funded by the operating or capital budgets of the Faculty. Arts faculty, support staff, and students are all eligible to apply for funding. Arts undergraduate and graduate students should note that in past years nearly all eligible student requests for Endowment Fund support received some funding. Remember that student requests should include a letter of support from their Department Head/Program Director. Retroactive applications for projects taking place prior to the application deadline will not be funded. Applications may be funded in whole or in part to a maximum
