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#### **Course Objectives and Description**

This course explores Canada's place in the international system. It addresses the main aspects of Canada's behaviour in the world, domestic and international influences on Canadian foreign policy. The course discusses certain historical legacies and continuities in Canadian foreign policy, dominant ideas and societal influences that have shaped it. The place and effects of important foreign policy makers, pressures from dominant powers, and provincial influences on international policy making is addressed in conjunction with Canadian priorities in foreign, security, and defence issues.

The first part of the course is based on Nossal's book and recent government policy papers. The second part is a collection of case studies from more recent Canadian efforts in related global or regional issues. The format of the course in the fall term will be a series of lectures and AV presentations. In the winter term we will have a series of presentations by students. The presentations will be guided by the assigned readings, but there will be a requirement of the presenters using at least two outside sources (academic books and journal articles, government documents, publications by international organizations and think tanks, etc.).
