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WELCOME FROM THE HEAD...

Hello everyone and welcome to *Psychobabble* for Fall 2011.

The last academic year saw continued impressive achievements by the faculty and students in the Department, along with development of a new children's camp based on Psychology. Read on to find out more!

Our faculty and students continued to make innovative and ground-breaking research discoveries and the 2 books, 26 book chapters, 74 journal articles and abstracts, 9 invited talks, and 118 conference presentations all attest to this. In addition, members of the department sat on 29 Editorial Boards (or were Associate Editors), held 71 grants totaling \$7,477,686.32, received \$1,063,079.04 in student scholarships, awards, and bursaries, and received several prestigious awards including

- Rayleen De Luca was named a member of the Order of Manitoba,
- Stephen Holborn received a Faculty/Staff Access Award from Disability Services,
- Debbie Kelly was given the inaugural Canadian Society for Brain Behaviour and Cognitive Sciences Early Career Award,
- Barry Mallin was honoured with an Award of Excellence from the Manitoba Association of School Psychologists, and

• Jacquie Vorauer was elected a Fellow of the Canadian Psychological Association.

These awards, publications and grants are a testament to the hard work of our faculty members and their students. This level of excellence is as apparent in the classroom as it is in the lab, and this year Dan Bailis was awarded the Psychology Department Teaching Award, and Melanie Glenwright received the Excellence in Teaching Award for Probationary Faculty in the Faculty of Arts.

Our excellent group of faculty has been augmented by the addition of two outstanding new members. Dr. Jennifer Theule, who will support teaching supervision and research in both the Clinical Psychology and School Psychology programs, and Dr. Don Stewart, who has taken over as the Director of the Psychological Service Centre. Jennifer and Don join a group of young and talented faculty members who have invigorated the Department with their expertise, commitment, and enthusiasm. The future of the Department looks very bright indeed!

Speaking of impressive young faculty, Dr. Corey Mackenzie has taken over as Director of the Clinical Training Program. He

NEW FACULTY ...

Dr. Don Stewart



I am very pleased to be taking up my new appointment as Director of the Psychological Service Centre. As a graduate of the Clinical program here, I have many fond memories of my own time spent training at the PSC, along with considerable excitement about ways to reinvigorate the centre to make it a more vital and dynamic training site.

Although I am new to the department, I bring over 20 years of experience in clinical supervision and professional practice to the PSC through my previous positions at the campus Student Counselling and Career Centre. During my time at SCCC, I served as Director of Training for its CPA/APA-accredited

internship and, more recently, as Director of the SCCC. This work in student services has helped me to develop a student-centred perspective on the campus, with a special focus on identifying and responding to the needs of students and developing strategic relationships with campus and community partners regarding how best to meet students' needs.

My professional areas of expertise encompass clinical supervision and training, student development, ethics and professional practice issues, and adult learning disabilities and attention deficit disorders. At the PSC I will be offering a specialty practicum in adult cognitive assessment through a newly-established assessment clinic, and continuing to practice integrative psychotherapy. I am also continuing to serve the university through membership on the Student Threat Assessment Triage, Intervention, and Support (STATIS) team. In addition to these campus activities, I am also contributing to professional regulation in Manitoba through my roles as a member of the Psychological Association of Manitoba **Continuing Education** Committee and Chair of the Code of Conduct Working Group.

My research interests are varied, and have included collaboration on such diverse topics as psychological functioning among Dental students, clinical vs. developmental social anxiety, and supervisor selfefficacy. I am currently involved in collaborative research with partners in Psychology, Clinical Health Psychology and the SCCC. These projects involve exploration of self-assessed supervisory competencies, mental health knowledge translation techniques for young adults, and factors associated with clinical help-seeking among university students.

My initial plan for the PSC is to look at ways to help it function more effectively as a 'hub' for Clinical students, including developing more lab and study space at PSC, and enhancing opportunities for on-site assessment training. I am also excited to work closely with others at the PSC to improve internal processes related to service delivery, tracking of student activities, and evaluation of outcomes. So far I have been warmly welcomed into the department, and I look forward to our collaborative efforts to create the best possible training environment for our students.

NEW FACULTY ...

Dr. Jennifer Theule



I am honoured to be joining the faculty at the University of Manitoba in what should be a very exciting appointment to Clinical and School Psychology. I come to my first faculty position following two years in the department as a sessional instructor and practicum supervisor in the School Psychology program. When not at the University, I filled my time in a busy private practice

where I worked with children, adolescents, and their families. Clinically, I have a particular interest in work with very young children (zero to six) and focused my time on work with this population.

Prior to arriving in Winnipeg, I graduated from the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education at the University of Toronto (OISE/UT) with a Ph.D. in School and Clinical Child Psychology. My research focused on parenting stress, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), parental involvement in schools, and sibling conflict in families of children with ADHD. I also investigated the role of parental depression and parental ADHD in the families of children with ADHD, as both of these disorders are relatively common in parents of children with ADHD. In my research, I have used meta-analysis to help clarify these relationships and uncover as moderators, such as child gender, which affect the

relationship (or effect) between child ADHD symptoms and parenting stress.

My research plans going forward include building on my work with families of children with ADHD. In particular, I am interested in the bidirectional relationships between parent and child ADHD, given the strong genetic basis for this disorder. Bringing together my clinical experiences and research interests, I am also working on a meta-analysis focusing on psychotherapeutic interventions with very young children in attempt to start clarifying this literature.

Outside of the psychology world, I have lived in Vancouver, Toronto, and Burlington and my travels have taken me to over 25 countries, but I am thrilled to be back home in Winnipeg where I was born and raised.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW? MEET LEE BAUGH



After completing my B.A. (Hons) in psychology, with a minor in legal studies and criminology, I went on to my graduate work (M. A. and Ph.D) at the University of Manitoba. Working with Dr. Murray Singer allowed me to continue my examination of reading processes in skilled readers. Once exposed to a course in functional neuroimaging, taught by Dr. Jonathan Marotta, my focus changed. After all these years of learning that cognitive processes are inferred from overt behavioural measures, I had been exposed to a dependent variable that is (almost) a direct measure of activity within a participant's brain.

I was hooked, and after completing my Masters degree examining how the multiple goals of narrative characters are represented in a reader's memory of a discourse, I made the switch into Dr. Jonathan Marotta's lab to receive training in this exciting research methodology There, I studied how visuomotor abilities vary as a function of the natural aging process and examined the neurological correlates of such task performance.

After completing my doctoral degree, I undertook postdoctoral training at the Centre for Neuroscience Studies at Queen's University with Dr. Randy Flanagan. While here, I have been exposed to an entirely new perspective for addressing issues in skilled movement acquisition and maintenance, rounding out my background to include elements of cognitive psychology, functional neuroimaging, computational neuroscience, and motor kinematics. I recently accepted a tenure- track position with the **Basic Biomedical Sciences** Neurogroup at the Sanford School of Medicine, University of South Dakota, and will be taking up the position in December of this year.

My current research focus examines how humans acquire and utilize skilled movement in a variety of circumstances. Movement is the only way we have to interact with our

surroundings. Whether we want to move to a more comfortable chair, speak to our colleagues, or play a round of golf, movement of one form or another is required. By combining my training in cognitive psychology, advanced analysis of movement kinematics, neuroimaging, and patient studies, I am able to examine how skilled actions are planned, learned, and controlled. Although we have created chess playing computer that can best grand masters, and even knowledge searching computers that can dominate over human players in Jeopardy, we have yet to create a robot with the manual dexterity of a four year old child! Of course, a true understanding of how humans both attain and maintain this remarkable skill set allows us to better model other less overt systems within the brain, has a direct impact on both functional assessment and rehabilitation regimens following brain injury or disease, allows for the creation of medical supportive devices that capitalize on functioning systems, and has implications in engineering fields such as prosthetics and telerobotics.
