Before you begin posting your thesis to MSpace, have a list of your committee members and their affiliations at hand, a copy of your abstract (up to 150 words for a thesis, 350 for a dissertation), a copy of your thesis in PDF, a copy of accompanying files (if applicable), and think about subject keywords relevant to your thesis.
