Minimum and maximum number of modules/credits to be taken in each semester/term	NUI Galway uses the ECTS (European Credit Transfer System). ECTS is based on the principle that 60 credits is a measure the workload of a full-time student during one academic year, and correspondingly, 30 credits for a semester. (The student workload of a full-time study programme in Europe amounts in most cases to around 1500-1800 hours per year and in those cases one credit stands for around 25 to 30 working hours.) The number of credits that should be taken by a visiting student is a matter for his/her home university to determine.	
Restricted programs or courses (i.e. not open to exchange students)	See the section on course information above.	
Are students allowed to take cross-faculty modules? If yes, are there any restrictions?	Students are expected to take courses within their chosen School; admission to courses provided by other Schools cannot be guaranteed. Selecting courses outside of the chosen school may result in timetable clashes at exam time.	
Can students take modules of a different level, e.g. students at Year 2 taking Level 3 modules?	This would depend on an assessment by the relevant NUI Galway academic department of the students' ability, academic background and exam results up to the time of application.	
Are there any special language courses for incoming exchange students prior to the exchange program stint? If yes, please advise schedule and costs.	No, but a five-week course of English language classes is provided for international students – this course usually starts soon after the beginning of each semester. The course is free of charge and consists of two 2-hour sessions per week (evenings).	
When will the academic transcripts of exchange students be sent?	Usually within about 6 weeks of the end of exams.

International students are advised to ensure that they have comprehensive health insurance which includes cover in the event of hospitalisation. services in a public hospital and all charges for doctors' services, drugs and medicines. Students who require private medical insurance should make arrangements for cover prior to departing from their home country, or alternatively they can contact Health Insurance Companies in Ireland, which offer private medical cover.

Student Counselling Service: It provides a professional and strictly confidential counselling service for all students experiencing problems, while pursuing their studies.

Disability Support Service: Students with disabilities - for example, learning difficulties, visual impairment, hearing impairment, or mobility problems - are advised to contact the University Disability Officer, Elizabeth Walsh, at the time of application for any information or assistance they may need.

Social Activities: There is no better way to integrate into the social, sporting and cultural life of the University than through membership of one of the University's clubs or societies. "Pleasant is the life of the scholar", says one of Ireland's old bardic poems, and indeed the student's life can be greatly enhanced by taking part in some of the many social and recreational activities on offer at the National University of Ireland, Galway. There are more than fifty societies and thirty athletic clubs on campus which cater for a wide variety of interests.

Restaurant Facilities: There are a number of restaurants and snack bars available on the campus, which are open throughout the day and evening. These cater for a variety of tastes and offer good value and choice. Note that the University does not offer a 'meal plan' option.
