The Faculty of Science is proposing the creation of a B.Sc. Minor in Ecology. The creation of this minor simply involves the re-grouping of existing courses. According to the proposal "The Ecology minor will allow students in other disciplines to pursue an area of related academic interest".

COPSE approved the statement of intent on November 15, 2001.

Professor Cooper advised that the Senate Executive Committee endorses the report to Senate.

It was moved by Dean Jamieson, seconded by Recteur Ruest, THAT Senate approve and recommend that the Board of Governors approve the Proposal of the Faculty of Science for a B.Sc. Minor in Ecology [as set out in the report of the Senate Committee on Curriculum and Course Changes dated September 17, 2002 and in the Report of the Senate Planning and Priorities Committee date June 4, 2002].

 Report of the Senate Committee on Academic Computing re the "Proposal for a Digital Copyright Clearance Pilot Project"

The Senate Committee on Academic Computing [SCACOM] reviewed and endorsed a Proposal for a Digital Copyright Clearance Pilot Project. The pilot project was developed by Lori Wallace, Director of Distance Education and revised by a sub-committee of SCACOM.

The pilot project hopes to:

- a) "establish a digital copyright clearance service that would entail researching contact information for copyright holders, requesting clearance and tracking and paying clearance charges",
- b) "establish copyright clearance guidelines and procedures"; and

c) "provide regular workshops for faculty and staff".

Professor Cooper advised that the Senate Executive Committee endorses the report to Senate.

It was MOVED by Dr. Lobdell, on behalf of the Committee, THAT Senate support the Digital Copyright Clearance Pilot Project, and urge that resources be allocated to the project.

3. Report of the Senate Committee on Rules and Procedures re proposed Faculty Council Bylaws for the Faculty of Environment

The Senate Committee on Rules and Procedures is charged to review and edit individual Faculty/School Council Bylaws. The Committee reviewed proposed Faculty Council Bylaws from the Faculty of Environment and found them to be in compliance with Policy 402 "Faculty and School Council General Bylaw". The Committee therefore recommends that Senate approve the Faculty of Environment Bylaw.

Professor Punter noted that in Section 2.1 d), the membership only provides for academics holding nil appointments. He suggested that it be amended to include those academics who hold salaried and nil salaried appointments. Professor Anderson suggested that it be amended to read "all those academics holding appointments".

It was MOVED by Dean Secco, seconded by Professor Punter that section 2.1 d) of the Bylaw be amended by replacing it with the phrase "all those academics holding appointments".

CARRIED

Professor Punter also noted that section 2.4 (c) should read "The establishment of, the abolition of, **or** any changes in division**s**, departments, chairs, lectureships in the Faculty;" [changes in bold]. Dean Secco agreed to these changes.

Professor Cooper advised that the Senate Executive Committee endorses the report to Senate.

It was MOVED by Dean Secco, on behalf of the Committee, THAT the Faculty of Environment Council Bylaw [as set out in the Report of the Senate Committee on Rules and Procedures dated October 7, 2002] be approved by Senate as amended.

In June of 2002, Mr. Michael McAdam, Vice-President (Administration), circulated a discussion paper on Information Technology, prepared by IST, to Deans and Directors. At the same time, Mr. McAdam invited the commentary of the Senate Committee on Academic Computing and SPPC.

Mr. McAdam observed that the discussion paper was prepared by the staff of IST and is for discussion purposes and that none of it is carved in stone. He also noted that his office had received a good amount of feed back and encouraged individuals who wished to provide their views to do so.

With regard to the report of SPPC, Professor Halden noted that the Committee endorses the report for information purposes and as a basis for institutional dialogue.

Dr. Lobdell, speaking on behalf of the Senate Committee on Academic Computing, noted that members of the committee expressed support for recommendations 2, 4 and 12.

Professor Feld noted that with regard to a technology fee, Mr. McAdam was quoted in the *Winnipeg Free Press* as being opposed to such a fee. He asked if the quote was

accurate. Mr. McAdam said that it was indeed correct, as it is his view that any fee is a tuition fee and as such is currently part of the provincial tuition freeze, adding that he would not consider such a fee in the upcoming fiscal year.

Mr. Kusie asked Mr. McAdam if such a fee would be considered in subsequent years if the provincial tuition fee freeze were to be lifted. Mr. McAdam replied by saying that there should be only one tuition fee for students and that they shouldn't be "nickled and dimed" to death by various other fees.

Professor Duckworth inquired as to the next steps in the discussion process and asked that Senate be informed during the process and be made aware of the issues raised by other stakeholder groups. Mr. McAdam noted that it was his intention to involve the Senate Committee on Academic Computing in the next round of consultations and that it was his hope to have the Committee serve as an oversight body for computing policy issues in the future.

Dean Jamieson suggested that it might be a good idea to delegate the Senate Committee on Academic Computing to work with Mr. McAdam to this end.

Professor Stimpson wondered whether it would be considered a new fee if faculties and schools required students to have a laptop or pay a laptop fee. Mr. McAdam said that it would be, noting that the guiding principle is that students should know how much their program will cost in advance of their starting the program.

It was MOVED by Dean Jamieson, seconded by Professor Duckworth, THAT Senate direct the Senate Committee on Academic Computing to report back to Senate on the IT Discussion Paper after consulting with the Vice-President (Administration) about the responses and submissions from Faculties and Schools.
