1. Report of the Faculty
Council of Graduate Studies
re New Courses and Course Changes

The Faculty of Graduate Studies recommended a number of graduate course changes from various departments. They include: Native Studies (+3 credit hours) and Human Nutritional Sciences (+0 credit hours) Further, the Faculty proposed the deletion of nine "interdisciplinary" courses and their introduction as courses in the departments from which they are offered. (+27 credit hours in Medicine and +3 credit hours in Human Nutritional Sciences).

In response to a question Dean Secco noted that the proposed Medicine courses have the departmental prefix listed as "xxx". These will be faculty-wide courses and a prefix will have to be assigned by the Student Records Office.

Dean Percival advised Senate that the Senate Executive Committee endorses the report to Senate.

It was MOVED by Dean Secco, seconded by Dean Hennen, THAT the Reports of the Faculty of Graduate Studies, as endorsed by the Faculty Council of Graduate Studies on November 14, 2002, be approved by Senate.

2. Proposal for the introduction of a Certificate in University and College Administration

Page 23

The Centre for Higher Education Research and Development (CHERD) is proposed the introduction of a Certificate in University and College Administration. The proposal was approved by the CHERD Council on November 27, 2002, and according the Taxonomy on Non-Degree Programs is being brought to Senate for Concurrence. The Certificate is

composed of four core courses and four options courses for a total of 200 contact hours. The entire program will be offered via WebCT.

Ms. Chatuvedi noted that the certificate program would be offered to middle managers in Universities and Colleges who seek additional courses, but are often not given travel grants, as this program can be completed any time, anywhere on the Internet.

Dean Percival advised Senate that the Senate Executive Committee endorses the report to Senate.

It was MOVED by Professor Cooper, seconded by Mr. Kozier, THAT the proposal for a Certificate in University and College Administration [as approved and recommended by the CHERD Council on November 27, 2002] be approved by Senate.

Professor Welsh paid tribute to Professor Klassen, noting his many accomplishments, on of which is the development of TESL/TEFL programs in the Faculty of Education.

3. In Memoriam - Professor Winston Rampaul

Professor Welsh, in paying tribute to Professor Rampaul, noted his contributions to improving education in Manitoba and around the world.

4. Annual Report - University Discipline Committee

Page 36

This is the annual report of the University Disciplinary Committee for the period September 1, 2001 to August 31, 2002. The Board of Governors has jurisdiction over discipline of students. However, Senate has traditionally reviewed this report before it is forwarded to the Board of Governors.

In response to a question from Professor Feld regarding how a student could unintentionally plagiarize a thesis (p.43), Dr. Jenkinson noted that while he could not speak to any specific case, international students often encounter difficulties because of different interpretations of plagiarism. Professor Feld suggested that the Dean of Graduate Studies take the issue under advisement.

Dean O'Kell asked what was meant on page 45 by "compulsory voluntary withdrawal". Dr. Jenkinson indicated that he thought it should read CW-F, compulsory withdrawal with a

grade of 'F'.

Professor Payne questioned the dissimilar punishments imposed for smoking marijuana and for selling it over the Internet. Dr. Jenkinson noted that the punishments were imposed by two different disciplinary authorities and that one of the reasons for the distribution of the report was to encourage uniformity. Dr. Szathmáry noted her concern over the instance of "sex abuse" on page 54 and indicated that this item would need to be followed up.

Professor Angel felt that there was a trend towards increased incidents. He requested that this be investigated, noting his wish to know what Faculty the students come from, what year in their programs they are and gender. The Chair indicated that Professor Angel's request would be forwarded to the University Discipline Committee for consideration.

Professor Svenne expressed the opinion that most of the increase in incidents involve computer account use, and can be attributed to more students using computer accounts and better ability to track the accounts on the part of IST.

5. <u>Annual Report - Canadian Forces University Program</u> Page 56

The annual report covers the period from September 1, 2001 to August 31, 2002. This year marks the twenty-eight year of the program

As a result of the Canadian Forces University Program (CFUP):

- 1. over 1100 Canadian Forces personnel and their dependants have obtained a degree on their own time;
- 2. the Department of National Defence, in keeping with its Defence 2000 commitment to life-long learning, has benefitted by more educated and motivated personnel; and
- the University of Manitoba received over \$748,000 in tuition fees from CFUP students in the past year, as well as a disproportionately large number of full-time subsidized CF students.

At the November 20, 2002 Senate Executive Committee meeting, the matter of Capital Renewal and Deferred Maintenance was raised. In response, the Vice-President (Administration) had a summary prepared of Capital Renewal and Deferred Maintenance expenditures from 2000-01 to present.

V REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

In augmenting her written report, Dr. Szathmáry noted that the first report of the Strategic Planning Committee would be inserted in the next edition of the *Bulletin*, and that public

hearings will be held on February 24 and 26 on the Fort Garry Campus and on February 25 on the Bannatyne Campus.

Dr. Szathmáry also highlighted the request for comments to the Review Committee for the Vice-President (Research) and invited members of Senate to make submissions to the Review Committee.

Ms. Goldie reported that the capital campaign has achieved a goal to dat of \$181.3-million, noting the recent announcement of the Richardson family's \$7-million gift to five areas of the campaign. She also noted that a campaign reception would be held in Vancouver on March 3.

Ms. Goldie also noted that the University's 30-second television commercial is currently running and that the "Bite-size Science" show of the Department of Human Nutritional Sciences is currently running nationally.

Professor Feld expressed his pleasure with the recent Richardson announcement and congratulated the administration for their efforts with regard to success of the Capital Campaign. This was met with a round of applause. Dr. Szathmáry thanked Professor Feld and credited Ms. Goldie for her leadership and hard work on the campaign.

Dr. Keselman reported that of the seven Manitobans recently named to the Order of Canada by Governor General Adrienne Clarkson, five of the new recipients are connected to the University of Manitoba. They are: Dr. Walter Bushuk, Professor Emeritus in Food Science, Dr. John Hamerton, Professor Emeritus, and former head of Human Genetics, Dr. Allan Lysack, Surgery, Dr. Theodore Schaefer, Distinguished Professor of Chemistry, and Dr. Robert Turner, Professor Emeritus in Music. She also noted that Professor Emeritus Jasper McKee and Professor Bruce Tefft of Psychology have been awarded Queen's Jubilee Medals. This was met with a round of applause. Professor Svenne noted that Professor Emeritus Robert Connor was also awarded the Queen's Jubilee Medal. This was also met with a round of applause.

With regard to the next CFI competition, the University has submitted notices for 38 applications. Dr. Keselman added that CFI has received over 900 notices from across the country and that \$2.5-billion in proposals will be competing for \$450-million in funding. Research Services will be working closely with researchers to ensure that the University's proposals are well-prepared.

Dr. Keselman advised Senate that the first tenants have moved into the multi-tenant facility at SmartPark, that TRLabs have also moved into their new facility, with an official opening to be held during the week of February 11.

Mr. McAdam, in updating Senate on the progress of the Resource Allocation Process reported that the Budget Advisory Committee would be meeting the week of February 11 to hear the submissions of the President and the Vice-Presidents. He also reported that the Board of Governors had approved fee increases for Law and Architecture and that they have been submitted to the provincial government.

Dr. Kerr reported that he has had 30 meetings with unit heads regarding their budget

submissions. He also reported meeting with each of the Vice-Presidents of the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority and was impressed and encouraged by their enthusiasm for, and willingness to cooperate with the University.

Ms. Ronald asked Dr. Kerr to provide an update on the fate of the Faculty of Graduate Studies top-up program. Dr. Szathmáry agreed to take the question under advisement and that a response would be provided at the next meeting of Senate.
