The Senate Committee on Curriculum and Course Changes met in October and November to consider requests from various units for course and curriculum changes with a net increase of less than 10 credit hours per department. Dean Frankel noted that there is one addition to the report, changes to the Biotechnology Honours program, which were handed out. Dean Frankel noted that, in the new year, the committee will examine the issue of offering a course as both a 6 credit hour course and two 3 credit hour course.

2. Proposed Academic Schedule for 2009-2010

Mr. Marnoch reported that Senate Executive had raised the question of whether classes could begin on Wednesday rather than Tuesday (the day the University opens); the Registrar reviewed the contact hours which would result from this change and, on that basis, moved the first day of classes to Wednesday. This modification from what was distributed to Faculties and Schools has been incorporated into the Academic Schedule that is included in the Senate agenda.

IV <u>REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT</u>

The President reported that he would speak in the same format as he had at the town hall which had occurred directly before the Senate meeting. He spoke in three sections: first impressions, actions around planning, and a review of his last couple of weeks.

First impressions. After the announcement about a year ago that he would be the new President, Dr. Barnard reported that he had periodically visited the University and has now has been here for six months. He reported that he had come to this position with a number of values which still remain important after this first year; namely:

- To be great and to be the best that we can be together
- To be looking ahead; to be laying the groundwork for even greater success for those that come after us
- For the executive to work with solidarity
- To not focus on who gets credit
- Humane treatment of people and intellectual engagement
- To have fun and maintain an environment where humour pervades
- Preserve a learning environment: on any given day we should make the best decisions we can make with what we know and with the experience we've had so far; and in this way we'll generate new experiences and we may do something different later on

The Chair went on to share his five point view of the President's role

- 1. set the tone
- 2. work with others to set the direction
- 3. get the best people into positions
- 4. get them the resources they need
- 5. get yourself and other obstacles out of the way

Dr. Barnard then made some observations:

- He observed that there are a lot of strong people at the institution, there is a strong leadership group, and there are many people in the community who see the importance of the University to the City of Winnipeg, and to the Province of Manitoba. He added that this does not occur at all universities.
- He observed that internally, the University community, often speaks more about constraints than we do about possibilities. On the basis of the size and the complexity of our programs, the University is underfunded compared to other medical-doctoral institutions in Canada. He reported that this would be an issue he would be addressing with the government. Dr. Barnard emphasized that the

University is comprised of an impressive group of people who can accomplish a lot and encouraged people to think as positively as possible.

- Another observation was on the sense of distance between the Fort Garry campus and the Bannatyne campus with the geographical labeling denoting a gap which is also seen in the way that we would talk about Fort Garry and Broadway to denote the gap between the University and the Government.
- A further observation was the extent to which this is a commuter campus and absence of a transparent interaction with community which happens in other large city/large university situations. Unlike institutions such as the University of Toronto which are located amongst other buildings in the city, the University of Manitoba is somewhat separated from the city and people leave downtown and go to the university. While that's a reality, it is important to minimize the negative impact that comes with this perception.
- A final observation was the need for more and better data about ourselves to make better decisions internally; to be informed but not constrained by data.

Actions around Planning. The President indicated the use of a SWOT(Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) analysis that was worked up about a year ago in the development of planning. This analysis has been discussed in meetings with the Deans & Directors and with the Board and will also come to Senate for discussion.

He reported that a planning document will be developed to put some of our thinking together for the next couple of years. The document will be relatively brief and will have a few components with a narrative linking the elements. While the previous plan has been completed and Dr. Szathmáry has reported on this, the President noted that an institution has a momentum and direction that would continue in its day to day activities; a planning document would direct the large decisions on new directions. Dr. Barnard reported that he would like to have a framework with criteria that would shape some of the decisions and perhaps a list some projects that the University needs to undertake as a community over the next period of time with three components: where is the University; what kind of criteria will the University use and what kind of additional activities will the University take on, and something to indicate that the University is doing a good job.

Review of Last Couple of Weeks. The President reported that he had been away from campus for almost two weeks, first at an alumni event in Ottawa and then onto India for a meeting with the Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry on education issues with a large number of colleges from Indian universities focusing on linking with Canada. This was followed by a meeting with the Association of Commonwealth Universities. Lastly, Dr. Barnard visited with colleagues Professor Jamie Blanchard and Professor Stephen Moses and the large group of people working on the HIV/AIDS project in Karnataka State. They are doing very significant and important work in a state with a population of twice that of Canada and, after a several of years, they are finding a substantial decrease in the incidence of HIV/AIDS infection. The President noted that this is not only interesting science, it is interesting to take something and scale it up so that it works in a population of that size. Dr. Barnard indicated that he is looking forward to getting to know the research that other faculty are engaging in within the city, province, country and around the world.

Dean Frankel reported that the committee is proposing a process to deal with courses not offered in the last five years and, additionally, to eliminate the "not currently offered" category in the course change process. The committee felt that these courses were confusing for students who think that the courses will eventually be offered when this is not generally the case. In addition, it was noted that the process to reactivate a course is the same as that to introduce a new course.

The question arose of departments who offer courses on a slower rotation (more than five years) due to various constraints. Dean Frankel responded that the recommendation recognizes this and allows for departments to request retention of a course beyond the five year period.

The suggestion was made that courses slated for deletion come to Senate for information prior to being deleted rather than after deletion. This suggestion will be referred to the Senate Committee on Curriculum and Course Changes for consideration.

Dean Frankel MOVED on behalf of the committee THAT Senate approve the Report of the Senate Committee on Curriculum and Course Changes [dated April 9, 2008] regarding Process for Deletion of Lapsed Courses and Elimination of "Not Currently Offered" Category.

Dr. Kerr spoke to this document which arises out of public assurance around quality of programs and what students can expect, outside of discipline specific knowledge, from their undergraduate experience. The document was developed through discussions at the Deans and Directors Council. Dr. Kerr emphasized that these expectations are not prescriptive in nature nor are they comprehensive across every program; the expectations, however, could be considered in the development of new programs.

Extensive discussion ensued on the document including its purpose, function and wording. Questions arose around:

- Implementation concerns: accountability, performance indicators, impact on the evaluation of programs and tenure
- Concern about specific reference to 'aesthetic sensibility through exposure to art, drama and literature' (p. 128) which was perceived to diminish the value of science
- Whether this document would have implications on improving pedagogy or influencing resource allocations
- Concern about references to 'responsibility for society...obligations of citizenship' (p. 127) which may be viewed as political terms contested by some
- Being based on the 2003 strategic academic plan which has concluded, is this document outdated.

Professor Anderson MOVED, seconded by Professor McIlwraith THAT Senate refer the document "Institutional Expectations for Undergraduate Programs" back to the Provost's Office.
