He indicated that, as Norman Halden and Mark Whitmore are faculty deans, nominations for the available position must be filled by a Senator with no administrative responsibilities beyond department head.

## VII REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

The Chair reported that the recent provincial budget includes a five percent increase to the University's operating grant. It is the second of three such increases that the Province had committed to last year. He observed that the additional revenue over the three-year period, which is considerably better than what is available for postsecondary institutions in other jurisdictions, will help the University of Manitoba close a gap, which has been observed in other discussions, between it and like universities in the country.

## VIII QUESTION PERIOD

Senators are reminded that questions shall normally be submitted in writing to the University Secretary no later than 10:00 a.m. of the day preceding the meeting.

The following question was received from Professor Julie Guard, Faculty of Arts.
This summer, a significant number of small seminar rooms have been allocated to ICM and the Intensive English Program and are not available for Arts courses. The shortage of these classrooms has reduced the already small number of classrooms
available and created problems for instructors whose teaching style works best in small seminar rooms. So that we can accurately assess the impact of this new policy, will the President request that Lori Wallace, Dean of Extended Education, or some other person, as appropriate, undertake to collect data on the number of requests received for small seminar rooms and the number of such requests denied? I request further that the President also request that data be collected on the actual use of such classrooms to determine whether all classrooms allocated to ICM and the English language program were actually used by those programs, and to determine the extent or type of use (i.e., for a class that met regularly, or for a single meeting, or some other type of use).

Dr. Collins indicated that, for the purpose of the discussion, in the absence of more specific information that he would define a small seminar room as classroom with a capacity of less than twenty. He acknowledged that there are opportunity costs associated with the allocation of instructional space and observed that these costs are borne by all programs. He observed, too, that space allocation is generally less problematic in the Summer term. Dr. Collins indicated that the International College of Manitoba (ICM) has no space allocation for a capacity of less than thirty students for the Summer term; as such they are not competing with Arts courses for small seminar rooms. The average ICM class size is forty students and the smallest class size is thirty students.

In response to Professor Guard's assertion that the number of small classrooms is limited, Dr. Collins said that he had been advised by the Registrar's Office that there is no shortage of small instructional spaces. He remarked that, given the recent implementation of the Ad Astra Scheduling Suite, it would possible to provide more objective information on the use of instructional space in the future. Dr. Collins informed members that, in the current term, there are fifty seminar rooms with a capacity of twenty or less available on the Fort Garry campus. Seventeen of these spaces have been assigned to the English Language Centre (ELC) or the Intensive English Program (IEP). Twenty of the fifty available seminar spaces are located in the Fletcher Argue Building, nine of which have been assigned to either the ELC or the IEP for the Summer term. Dr. Collins indicated that data for the Bannatyne campus are not available.

Referring to Professor Guard's request that data be gathered on the number of requests for small seminar rooms that are received and denied, in order to assess the impact of the new policy, Dr. Collins clarified that there is no new policy that concerns the allocation of classroom space. With respect to collecting data on requests for small seminar rooms, he noted that room bookings for the Summer term are not tracked centrally, as they are made through Faculty offices which may or may not track this type of data. He concurred that tracking data on summer session is something the University needs to review for the future.

Regarding Professor Guard's request that data be collected on the actual use of small seminar rooms allocated to ICM and the IEP, to determine the extent and type of use, Dr. Collins noted that both the IEP and the ELC have been asked by the Registrar's office to advise Faculty schedulers, as a standard practice, when a room will not be required so the space can be reallocated. He questioned how Senate would be served by knowing the regularity of classes in the IEP and the ELC, but indicated that he would respond to Senate's directions. He suggested, anecdotally, that there are greater issues
arising from the failure to use scheduled space in the broader University than in these particular programs.
