V <u>REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT</u>

President Barnard welcomed Senators back following the holiday break and offered his personal reflections, at the start of a New Year. He observed that each unit of time that passes, whether it is a second, or time in this meeting, or a year or decade, is filled with unique experiences, but some are experienced as being more disruptive and perhaps uncomfortable than are some others. Certainly, many had experienced 2017 in this way. The year had been unusual in many ways, including on global, national, and provincial scales; it had included things that were good and bad, some that came close to terrifying, and some that disappointed and some that pleased. In the context of the University of Manitoba, too, many things had happened that could be assessed as either positive or negative. There had been government interventions and decisions that had disappointed, and many had been disappointed in the delayed response to the fundamental science review. Among the positive things was the capital campaign, which had provided funding for many opportunities and priorities on campus.

President Barnard said it could be a challenge, in the midst of the many things that were happening, to focus on the large project that the University was engaged in. Many Senators would have heard him refer to this as building bigger futures for the University's students, their families, and the communities where they would live and work. President Barnard said it often struck him that, in the mundane day-to-day realities and in the different perspectives individuals sometimes had on these realities, it was important to remember the University's shared commitment to the larger project of education, research, service, and to engaging intellectually in a way that left rooms for others, quoting Mr. Claude Généreux, Executive Vice-President, Power Corporation of Canada, who observed that universities were places where people could engage intellectually in ways that left room for others.

President Barnard welcomed Senators back to work on the project and wished them the best, professionally and personally, in the year ahead.

3. Report of the Faculty Council of Graduate Studies on Program Page 44 and Curriculum Changes RE: Ph.D. in Applied Health Sciences

Dean Mondor said the Applied Health Sciences program was proposing two changes to the Ph.D. in Applied Health Sciences. One was to revise the admission requirements to allow graduates of course-based Master's degrees to be considered for admission, and the second was to require students admitted with a course-based Master's degree to complete a 6 credit hour course, AHS 7010 - Introductory Research Project in Applied Health Sciences, to provide them with additional support for conducting Ph.D. research.

Dean Mondor MOVED, seconded by Dean Postl, THAT Senate approve the Report of the Faculty Council of Graduate Studies on Program and Curriculum Changes concerning the Ph.D. in Applied Health Sciences, effective September 1, 2018.

XI ADDITIONAL BUSINESS

The Chair recalled that, at the April 2017 meeting, Senate had considered the initial proposal for a Master of Human Rights program, as summarized in the Report of the Executive Committee of the Faculty of Graduate Studies on Course and Curriculum Changes included with the agenda. At that meeting, Senate had identified several concerns with the proposal and, following a lengthy discussion, had taken a decision to postpone consideration of the proposal indefinitely. The Chair informed Senate that, in the intervening months, the proposal had been revised to address Senate's concerns, including to locate the interdisciplinary program within the Faculty of Law. The revised proposal had been reviewed and endorsed by the Senate Planning and Priorities Committee, in November, and by the Senate Executive committee, in December.

The Chair informed Senate that Dean Black-Branch, Faculty of Law, had communicated his intent to make a motion that Senate resume consideration of the proposal.

Dean Black-Branch MOVED, seconded by Professor Schultz, THAT Senate resume consideration of the Master of Human Rights program following postponement of that discussion at the meeting on April 5, 2017.

1. Proposal for a Master of Human Rights, Faculty of Law

Dean Black-Branch referred Senators to his memo to Dr. Barnard, dated December 1, 2017, which highlighted how the revised proposal for a Master of Human Rights degree addressed concerns raised at Senate in April. In order to respond to concerns about governance, he said the program, which would continue to be an interdisciplinary Master's degree, would be based in the Faculty of Law, which would have administrative responsibility for the program. Financial concerns were addressed, in part, by housing the program in Robson Hall, which would eliminate the need for costly renovations that would have been required to locate the program in the Tier Building. The cost of renovations that would be need in Robson Hall would be funded by the Faculty of Law. Additionally, funding for an endowed Chair had been confirmed and an announcement of the gift had been made. Funds (\$500,000) had also been contributed to an endowment fund for graduate fellowships and bursaries and the province would match fifty percent of the amount disbursed to students through the Manitoba Scholarship and Bursaries Initiative.

The Chair referred Senators to the committee's observations in the Report.

b) Report of the Executive Committee of the Faculty of Page 184 Graduate Studies on Program and Curriculum Changes

Dean Mondor said an external review of the program proposal completed by Dr. Howard-Hassmann, Wilfred Laurier University, and Dr. Packer, University of Ottawa, was highly complementary. The reviewers had remarked on the trailblazing nature of the program and had identified that there were strong contributing faculty members and institutional resources to support the program. Reviewers had also suggested there would be high demand for graduates of the program.

Dean Mondor said, although the administrative home had changed to the Faculty of Law, the integrity of the academic program had been preserved. On this basis, the Faculty of Graduate Studies remained supportive of the implementation of the program. The Faculty Council of Graduate Studies had unanimously endorsed the proposal at its meeting on June 24, 2016.

Dean Mondor MOVED, seconded by Professor Farenhorst, THAT Senate recommend that the Board of Governors approve a proposal for a Master of Human Rights degree (dated November 14, 2017), with the *proviso* that the Provost and Vice-President (Academic) not implement the program until satisfied that there would be sufficient space and sufficient funding to support the ongoing operation of the program.

Professor Austin-Smith said that, when the list of electives courses (Appendix A) had been established, the only English course that had

been included was ENGL 7860 Topics in Cultural Studies, when the topic was "An Introduction to Genocide Studies." She proposed that, when the list is next modified, it might be amended to include ENGL 7XXX to allow for a variety of people teaching at the graduate level in the Department of English, Theatre, Film & Media, who engage in human rights-related teaching activities to be involved in teaching in the program.
