Elective: Internal Medicine; Hepatology

INTRODUCTION

The Hepatology Elective is offered at the Health Sciences Centre and is an in- and out-patient clinical experience. It is a third and fourth year elective. The Hepatology consult service provides consultative advice regarding any in-patient with suspected or established liver disease. The consult service consists of a Hepatologist staff member, and at times, a GI or Hepatology Fellow, Internal Medicine Resident and/or Medical Student. After you have assessed the new consult, you should set up a time with the Hepatology staff member in order to review and learn from this case.

The student will see patients in a variety of Liver Clinics, at which time they will have the opportunity to see a new patient and have that case reviewed with the attending physician. There are three types of outpatient clinics. There are General Hepatology clinics and Viral Hepatitis Investigative Unit Clinics. These clinics are located primarily in the Health Sciences Centre. The history, physical, diagnosis, special tests and management will be discussed at this time. A reading outline will be provided on the student's first day, and a collection of current review articles will be provided during their orientation.

Availability

Most months are acceptable, however, January, July, August and December are difficult to accommodate due to attendings absences for conferences and breaks. Students often cannot be assigned until annual residents requests arriving between May to end of June have been accommodated.

Minimum or Maximum Period of Time:

While preference is for 4 weeks to accommodate orientation and better assessments, 3 week requests will be considered.

One per time frame, per site. Preference will be given to Canadian Citizens.
