



DEAN'S MESSAGE

The College of Nursing team achieved inspiring accomplishments in 2021-22 amidst the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. Given the exceptional work of our leaders, faculty, staff and clinical partners, students were able to progress in their studies and complete their courses and programs, resulting in the convocation of 249 graduates from our Bachelor of Nursing program and 25 graduates from our Master's and PhD programs. These graduates are providing exemplary care in cities and communities throughout Manitoba and are making a significant difference in addressing the growing nursing shortage in the province.

It was with pride that we commemorated noteworthy milestones including the resumption of an inperson Pinning Ceremony and Convocation to celebrate the graduation of our stellar students. This year's Convocation was extra special in that Jan Currie, our esteemed alumna, was awarded an Honorary Degree Doctor of Laws. A leader, advocate and skilled nurse, Jan dedicated her career to shaping the Manitoba health care system for nearly four decades. In addition, two of our professors, Dr. Roberta Woodgate and Dr. Tom Hack, were honoured with the presentation of the Distinguished Professor designation.

We were delighted to have the unique opportunity to establish the long-awaited Bachelor of Midwifery program and welcome six stellar students into the program. The midwifery program integrates knowledge of traditional Indigenous midwifery practices and prepares graduates to support midwifery services in urban, rural and northern communities.

The College of Nursing is pleased to provide leadership in assisting to address the critical nursing shortage by expanding our Bachelor of Nursing program by 50 per cent, from 280 to 400 seats. The expansion is being accomplished by adding a third intake of 120 students in Winnipeg each year starting in May 2023. In addition, by offering the program year-round, or across three terms per year, students will complete the program one year ahead of the previous schedule.

Despite the restrictions in conducting research during the pandemic, our researchers were successful in securing significant research grants and publishing their excellent work. Our Manitoba Centre for Nursing and Health Research received a five-year renewal in recognition of its stellar work in facilitating and supporting faculty and students in conducting research and in promoting the conduct of impactful research.

The College of Nursing is continuing to create a culturally welcoming workplace that respects equity, diversity and inclusion. Our Anti-Racism Committee organized a remarkable monthly speaker series called "Let's Talk About Racism in Nursing" to facilitate education and dialogue on creating culturally safe learning and working environments.

Over our 79-year history, the College of Nursing has prepared more than 10,243 nurses and nurse leaders, who have provided leadership and exemplary service here in Manitoba and indeed around the world. We are proud to continue to answer the call and educate the finest future nursing professionals in Canada.

I extend my immense gratitude to the College of Nursing team for their excellence, dedication and resilience in the face of this unprecedented pandemic.



ACADEMICS

We are proud of our 1,043 students within the College of Nursing's undergraduate and graduate education programs, including the 100 students enrolled in the collaborative University College of the North (UCN) cohort. The majority or 89 per cent (925) of the students are enrolled in the undergraduate programs, while 11 per cent (118) are enrolled in the graduate programs.

UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMS

The Bachelor of Nursing (BN) program admitted 280 students, with 240 students in Winnipeg (120 students in September and 120 students in January), 20 students in The Pas and 20 students in Thompson. Gaining entry into the BN program remained very competitive, having received 928 applications, with four applications per seat in Winnipeg. Of the students admitted, 12 per cent were Indigenous, 14 per cent were international, 78 per cent were female, and 22 per cent were male.

With 919 students enrolled in the program across the three sites, the BN program is the largest program within the College of Nursing, as well as the largest nursing education program in Manitoba. Of the 919 students enrolled across the years, 15 per cent were Indigenous, and 10 per cent were international.

It was with pride that we celebrated the achievement of our 249 graduates from the BN program, including three graduates from the Bachelor Program for Registered Nurses (BPRN) and 33 from the UCN cohort. Of the graduates, 70% were female, 30% were male, 10% were Indigenous, and 4% were international students. It is impressive that 97% of graduates were employed at six months post-graduation in Manitoba.

There were 25 new students were admitted into the Mahkwa omushki kiim: Pathway to Indigenous Nursing Education (PINE). Overall, there were 39 students enrolled in the PINE. Twelve PINE students completed University 1 and were admitted into the BN program.

The Bachelor of Midwifery program received 17 applications for the six seats in the program or 2.8 applications per seat. Six students were admitted, all were female and one was an Indigenous student.

The level of interest in our graduate programs remained very high. We received 73 applications for the 53 seats available, representing 1.4 applications per seat. Due to the pandemic, all graduate courses were offered virtually, using

synchronous and asynchronous learning activities. Oral examinations for thesis/dissertation defences were held virtually and the NP students and faculty participated in virtual Objective Structured Clinical Examinations with standardized patients.



ACHIEVEMENTS: GRADUATE PROGRAMS

- Bonn Alvarez and Vanessa Bailon, MN students, provided leadership as co-chairs of the Graduate Nursing Students Association (GNSA).

EMPATHIC COMMUNICATION

Michelle Lobchuk, associate professor in the

College of Nursing, taught a series of workshops on empathetic communication for RFHS healthcare educators and professionals. Her research expertise is in empathetic communication, interprofessional team empathy, family caregiving and self-care management. Among the session topics were teacher empathy and how to receive feedback. Michelle says it starts with selfawareness – you have to be aware of your own biases, prejudices and assumptions of why you interpret things the way you do. She noted that students in health sciences need to know how to receive feedback in a respective manner, especially at the bedside, because sometimes it feels like someone is criticizing. In her final session, Michelle provided an overview of the smartphone app that she has been developing in collaboration with Dr Nicole Harder, associate professor, College of Nursing and Mindermar Professor in Human Simulation, and Dr. Marcia Friesen, dean of the Price Faculty of Engineering. Michelle began testing the app with nursing students last year. Since then, she's been approached by researchers at other universities across North America and encouraged to complete the development and implementation of the app.

CREATING CULTURALLY SAFE LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS FOR BIPOC STUDENTS

Shireen Bell, a nursing faculty member at Red Deer College, joined the PhD program at the College of Nursing in 2019. She presented one of the sessions of the speaker series, Let's Talk About Racism in Nursing. Shireen's PhD research explores expressions of resilience in undergraduate nursing students who identify as BIPOC. Shireen noted that students benefit from culturally safe learning environments and that the experiences of students from different cultures are unique, contextual and complex — it's not one-recipe-fits-all, which makes it more challenging.

Shireen spoke from her own experience — she was born in India and immigrated to Canada at two-years old. Shireen commended UM Rady Faculty of Health Sciences for being the first university in Canada to have a formal disruption of racism policy, as well as the College of Nursing for developing the antiracism committee that created the monthly speaker series.



EXPLORATION AND INNOVATION

It is with pride that we share the exciting research of our College of Nursing faculty and the difference they are making in improving the lives of patients and families, optimizing health systems and influencing health policy. We are proud of our exceptional research chairs, Dr. Roberta Woodgate and Dr. Diana McMillan, and their leadership in advancing research.

Our Manitoba Centre for Nursing and Health Research (MCNHR) promoted and supported the conduct, dissemination and uptake of collaborative nursing and health research to benefit the health of Manitobans and beyond. The MCNHR supported its 246 members in pursuing excellence in research and innovative research ideas.

The College of Nursing researchers were awarded new research funding amounting to more than \$2.23 million, with 29 research grants, 8 tri-agency funded.

RESEARCH CHAIRS

Dr. Roberta Woodgate, distinguished professor, holds a Tier 1 Canada Research Chair Award in Child and Family Engagement in Health Research and Healthcare. Remarkably, she received three CIHR grants in 2021-22 amounting to \$1.6 million. She will examine the indirect and wider health impacts of COVID-19 on families of children living with disabilities. In another project, Woodgate is developing a community-based mental health and well-being program for youth that involves an enhanced partnerships between schools and youth hubs in Winnipeg. In a third CIHR project, Dr. Woodgate is working with young people living with chronic pain to develop and codesign arts-based knowledge translation products meant to advance patient-centered care in young people living with chronic pain.

Dr. Woodgate also received one New Frontiers in Research Fund (NFRF) grant for the Innovative Approaches to Research in the Pandemic Context competition amounting to \$177,478.00. For this NFRF project, she is working with youth co-researchers in co-designing, implementing, and evaluating a new visual arts-based methods (ABM) approach that promotes best practices to applying visual ABM in an online environment for use in youth mental health research.

Dr. Diana McMillan, associate professor and Health Sciences Centre clinical chair, is connecting academics, researchers and nurses in clinical practice to promote clinical practice excellence and scholarship across both organizations. McMillan is working collaboratively with multiple multidisciplinary teams on projects related to patient mobility, virtual patient education, patient satisfaction of oncology patients in the transition from acute care to the community, COVID point-of-care testing, long-COVID symptom management care models, evaluation of the Manitoba TeleStroke program, patient values and preferences on polypharmacy and deprescribing, graduate nurse staff mentorship and virtual care nursing. Patient data collection was paused for an extended period in the reporting year due to the pandemic. However, progress continued on data analysis, manuscript preparation, literature syntheses and grant preparation, with a CIHR Operating grant submission (2021-10), and Heart and Stroke Foundation Operating grant submitted (2022-06; funding of \$190,000 secured), and two conference abstracts submitted and accepted for presentation at the international nursing education (NETNEP) conference in Spain in October, 2022.

Our Programs and Services



The College of Nursing launched its new Bachelor of Midwifery program in September 2021. Six students were admitted into Year 2 of the program, who were excited to begin their midwifery education close to home.

The College of Nursing is the only institution in Manitoba to offer a full range of undergraduate and graduate nursing education programming. Our Bachelor of Nursing program is delivered at Fort Garry Campus in Winnipeg with an intake of 240 students, and an intake of 40 students in the Collaborative University College of the North (UCN) Cohort. Admissions to the Bachelor Program for Registered Nurses have been suspended due to low enrolment.

The College of Nursing has enjoyed a strong 24-year partnership with UCN for the delivery of the Bachelor of Nursing program in The Pas and Thompson. The senate-approved enhancements to the partnership were implemented this past year.

Our Skills and Simulation Centres provided a real-life environment for students to practice and develop their critical thinking and clinical skills in a safe environment where patients will not be harmed.

The College of Nursing is actively engaged in interprofessional education and collaborative practice. All nursing students participated in an interprofessional team comprised of students from nine health care programs within the Rady Faculty of Health Sciences.

Our Mahkwa omushki kiim: Pathway to Indigenous Nursing Education (PINE) is designed to prepare Indigenous students for entry into the BN program and support them throughout the program. Of the 24 Indigenous students admitted into the BN program, 12 were from the PINE.



At the request of the Authorized Prescriber Steering Committee and with funding from Manitoba Government, the CCA Centre developed the clinical competency assessment for the Authorized Prescriber for Diabetes Health and for Reproductive Health, Sexually Transmitted Infections and Blood-Borne Pathogens.

Our graduate programs include a Master of Nursing program with 45 seats across the four streams of administration, education, clinical nurse specialist and nurse practitioner, as well as a PhD in Nursing program.

The Manitoba Centre for Nursing and Health Research (MCNHR) supports the 28 active researchers in the college, along with faculty, staff and students in the engagement in research and scholarship. The MCNHR provides a range of supports and services to advance research capacity and success.

The Clinical Competence Assessment (CCA)
Centre conducts competency assessments of
internationally educated nurses and other nurses
referred by the College of Registered Nurses of
Manitoba.

RESPONSE TO COVID-19 PANDEMIC

The College of Nursing experienced an unprecedented year as our entire team of leaders, faculty and staff joined efforts in addressing the challenges related to the sustained impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. Their exceptional work resulted in inspiring accomplishments. Our faculty continued to offer the theory courses through remote delivery, while working from home.

With the implementation of rigorous personal protective equipment and cleaning protocols by our skills team, our skills courses were offered in-person successfully. A combination of virtual, synchronous and asynchronous simulation activities were used.

Our clinical team worked tirelessly in making adjustments to ensure clinical placements could continue. However, the impact of the Fall 2021 labour disruption combined with COVID-19 resulted in the deferral of the completion of some of the clinical courses in May/June 2022 session.

The outcome of this unparalleled contribution of this stellar team is that students were able to continue their studies, complete their program and convocate on schedule. These graduates are making a significant difference in addressing the growing nursing shortage in the province.

IMPLEMENTATION OF OUR NEW BACHELOR OF MIDWIFERY PROGRAM

We were delighted to launch our new Bachelor of Midwifery program and welcome our six stellar students to the program. Students are now able to stay in Manitoba and close to home to complete their midwifery education. The midwifery program integrates knowledge of traditional Indigenous midwifery practices and prepares graduates to support midwifery services in rural and northern communities. Given the need for Indigenous midwives in northern Manitoba, half of the seats are designated for Indigenous students. Being able to prepare graduates to support families in childbearing points to a promising new era for midwifery services for Manitobans.

EXPANSION OF OUR BACHELOR OF NURSING PROGRAM

The College of Nursing is providing leadership in assisting to address the critical nursing shortage by expanding our Bachelor of Nursing program by fifty percent. The expansion is being accomplished by adding a third intake of 120 students in Winnipeg each year starting in May 2023. In addition, by offering the program yearround, or across three terms per year, the time to completion of the existing program will be 28 months versus the current 36 to 40 months. As such, students will be available to enter the nursing workforce one year ahead of the regular schedule. This initiative results in the expansion from 280 seats to 400 seats in the BN program.



VIRTUAL SIMULATION AND VIRTUAL REALITY

To address the challenges of offering in-person simulation during the pandemic, our expert simulation team incorporated virtual simulations in the delivery of our clinical courses. Using both purchased and in-house simulations developed by our team, students developed their knowledge and competencies using virtual learning strategies. In addition, our simulation team developed immersive virtual reality for integration into clinical courses that will be implemented in Fall 2022.

INCREASE IN RURAL AND NORTHERN CLINICAL PLACEMENTS

To facilitate student engagement in rural and northern clinical placements, the Rady Faculty of Health Sciences established a fund to support travel and accommodation costs of students. During the Fall Term, students in the Bachelor of Nursing program engaged in rural and northern clinical placements in Churchill, Swan River, Dauphin, Boundary Trails, Steinbach, Selkirk, Beausejour, Gimli, Lake Manitoba First Nations, and Pinaymootang First Nations.

A student in the Nurse Practitioner program completed a rural clinical placement at Percy Moore Hospital in Hodgson, Man., serving Peguis, Fisher River and Kinonjeoshtegon (Jackhead) First Nations, as well as the communities of Fisher Branch and Hodgson.

With the reinstatement of the Northern Senior Practicum Opportunity, funded by Manitoba Health, two Winnipeg-based students completed their Senior Practicum in The Pas.

ADVANCEMENT OF THE TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION CALLS TO ACTION

The College of Nursing was actively engaged in implementing strategies to address the health related calls to action made by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. The College of Nursing was successful in recruiting seven Indigenous faculty and staff including two Knowledge Keepers, a Director of Mahkwa omushki kiim and Indigenous Engagement, an assistant professor, an instructor, a student advisor and a program assistant. As well, a Nil Appointment was established to facilitate collaboration with Dr. Wanda Phillips Beck, Indigenous Research Chair in Nursing.

With the hiring of two Indigenous Knowledge Keepers to support both students and faculty, their services will be increased from two to four days per week. The study space for Indigenous students is being renovated to support collaboration with Indigenous colleagues and accommodate Indigenous ceremonies.

With support from RFHS, the College of Nursing continued to offer the Manitoba Indigenous Cultural Safety Training (MICST) program to our faculty and staff. The available seats were readily filled with faculty and staff eager to learn more about cultural safety.

The College of Nursing implemented the *Prevention of Learner Mistreatment Guidelines* and the related online Speak Up Button in an effort to promote a respectful and supportive teaching and learning environment, where learners feel safe to report incidents of mistreatment. With the online reporting system, individuals can choose to report anonymously and the reports remain confidential.

The College of Nursing Anti-Racism Committee achieved its goal to raise awareness and provide venues to engage in dialogue about the experiences of racism in nursing. The Anti-Racism Committee established the Speaker Series, "Lets' Talk About Racism in Nursing", and hosted a monthly interactive session presented by local and national dynamic scholars. The sessions were very well received.

The Bachelor of Midwifery program students are joining the Bachelor of Nursing program students in taking the required course on Human Diversity, a course that addresses cultural safety, Truth and Reconciliation, and racism, and is taught by Indigenous instructors. The blanket exercise and Indigenous ways of teaching and learning, including an immunization simulation using First Nations actors, have been integrated into both curricula. In addition, the students in the Bachelor of Midwifery program take a required course on Indigenous Peoples of Canada as an admission requirement.

To facilitate enrolment of Indigenous students, the Canadian Indigenous Category was increased from 20 to 30 in the Bachelor of Nursing program. In the nurse practitioner program, 20 per cent of program seats were designated to students with Indigenous ancestry.

The Indigenous Nursing Advisory Council continued to provide advice and guidance to the College of Nursing related to the currency, relevance and quality of its support services for Indigenous students in the Mahkwa omushki kiim and Bachelor of Nursing program.

The Nursing Students' Association hosted its seventh annual Orange Shirt Day event virtually featuring guest speakers, singers and dancers. A unique addition to the event was the viewing of a video produced for the event, featuring Indigenous artwork and children from Pinaymootang School, Oak Bluff Community School and Duke of Marlborough School discussing what Orange Shirt Day means to them. The students renewed their pledge to provide culturally safe nursing care.

SUPPORTING MENTAL HEALTH AND WELL-BEING



An innovative team of faculty and staff developed the "Connecting One Conversation at a Time" initiative that resulted in the installation of three benches on the Fort Garry campus to offer a comfortable place to speak to a friend or colleague, to meet new people, or to look up information about mental health and wellness through the strategically placed QR code on the benches and website links. The QR code connects students with a range of mental health resources related to suicide prevention and other important mental health issues. As such, this initiative helps foster a healthy and caring community and creates an environment that builds awareness of mental health. A special thanks to our faculty Dr. Elaine Mordoch, Shelley Marchinko, and Pat Pruden, and students Zoie Hetletvedt, Gillian Laninga and Winter Traverse.

MCNHR PROGRAM REVIEW

The Manitoba Centre for Nursing and Health Research (MCNHR) achieved a five-year renewal from UM as part of its ongoing program review process. The MCNHR has provided the key infrastructure and leadership for nursing research within the College of Nursing for 37 years.

The reviewers acknowledged MCNHR's commitment to, and support for, graduate student training.

They also recognized the "incredible value" of its professional development programs that have contributed to shaping the careers of graduate students. As well, the reviewers noted that the MCNHR serves as an essential and highly valuable resource for faculty, students and others.



LOOKING FORWARD

We look forward with anticipation to returning to on-campus delivery of our programming and connecting with our students, faculty, staff and partners in-person. While this past year has, by necessity, been focused on ensuring everyone's safety during the pandemic, we welcome the opportunity to enhance the students' educational experience by incorporating in-person programming.



We are also excited to implement Year 3 of our new Bachelor of Midwifery program and increase our seats in the program from six to eight.

We will continue our preparation for the implementation of a third intake of 120 students in our Bachelor of Nursing program in Winnipeg in May 2023. We will offer a Summer Term for our fourth year nursing students in May 2023, which will result in their completion of the program four months ahead of the regular schedule and their earlier entry into the nursing workforce.

We will continue to advance our work in incorporating Indigenous knowledge, ways of knowing and pedagogies into our curricula, offering cultural safety education for our faculty, staff and students, and recruiting Indigenous faculty, staff and students. We will also continue our efforts in raising awareness and addressing issues relating to racial equity and ensuring a safe work and learning environment in collaboration with our anti-racism committee.

As we continue to educate nurses and midwives for the future, our inspiring team of leaders, educators, researchers and support staff will continue to provide quality education, implement innovative teaching and learning strategies and conduct timely research.



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
