From Stan Rogers' frolicking FOGARTY'S COVE and rowdy NORTHWEST PASSAGE, through Connie Kaldor's Saskatchewan-inspired love song WOOD RIVER, James Gordon's haunting and chilling FROBISHER BAY to Oscar Peterson's inspiring HYMN TO FREEDOM these songs give a voice to our country.

Of course what patriotic collection would be complete without THE MAPLE LEAF FOREVER and O CANADA.

We are proud to present this collection of some of Canada's finest music with hopes that you will enjoy it for years to come.



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The Songs

The Maple Leaf Forever (Words by Vladimir Radian, Music by Alexander Muir, arranged by Ron Smail) [4:08]

This arrangement by Ron Smail provides an excellent setting of Vladimir Radian's reworked and politically sensitive lyrics to this great anthem to the qualities of life and national pride we are fortunate enough to have in our country. Written in 1867, and considered by many to be the "first Canadian National Anthem", it is a fitting prelude to the sentiment and theme for this collection of "Canadiana".

Away From the Roll of the Sea^{\S} (Words and music by Allister MacGillivray, arranged by Diane Loomer) [3:57]

With ocean surrounding our country on three sides, it is natural that we include songs acknowledging and honouring the importance of life on the water. Diane Loomer's arrangement of *Away From the Roll of the Sea* is one of the most beautiful sea-songs in our repertoire; with its rich harmonies supporting a lilting melody, all floating on the piano part providing the rise and fall of the ocean waves.

Un Canadien Errant[®] (Antoine Gérin-Lajoie, arranged by Eleanor Daley) [4:09]

This plaintive song, which tells of the pain of exiled French-Canadians following the Lower Canada Rebellion of 1837-1838, was actually arranged for treble voices by Eleanor Daley. It was too beautiful to resist, so the Bison Men simply sang the arrangement from the treble transcription, without any modifications except to sing in their own range. Daley's arrangement moves from the first verse in unison (highlighting the gorgeous melody) through a two-part second verse and finally the three-part acapella third verse.

Hymn to Freedom^{TI} (Lyrics by Harriette Hamilton, music by Oscar Peterson, arranged by Harold Christie and Steve Denby after an arrangement by Paul Read) [3:37]

Performed and recorded by many artists in many styles, Peterson's *Hymn to Freedom* not only illustrates the brilliance of Peterson's musicality, but also the importance of the qualities of tolerance, freedom, and a dignity which bind us not only as a country, but as a people. We have taken some liberties with a few text elements in order to make this version as inclusive as possible.

Fogarty's Cove[§] (Stan Rogers, arranged by Ron Smail) [2:06]

The place that inspired *Fogarty's Cove* consists of two parcels of provincial Crown land running along the rugged southern shore of Chedabucto Bay in Nova Scotia. That province has actually proposed to officially name this area Fogarty's Cove to commemorate Stan and his song, as no place carried that name when he wrote this song. This is essentially a love song telling the story of how the sailor and his beloved cope with the stresses of separation due to the long periods he spends at sea. Smail's arrangement features the baritone section with the other voices providing a rollicking vocal accompaniment.

Song For the Mira (Words and music by Allister MacGillivray, arranged by Stuart Calvert) [4:43] Solos by: Victor Boudreau, Tim Sale, Ken Cairnie, Derek McLean, Paul Hope, Jim House Violin: Rachel Moody

The Mira River is Cape Breton's longest river. The river's width and calm waters make it ideal for pleasure boating and fishing and its banks abound with swimming spots and sandy pleasure coves. The Mira slowly flows in a leisurely manner much like the citizens who live, work and play in this utopian destination (one of many) in Cape Breton. Come with us as we sing of its charms.

Four Strong Winds (Words and music by Ian Tyson, arranged by Larry Nickel) [4:35] Being from Winnipeg (boasting Portage & Main - the windiest intersection in Canada) the Bison Men are all too familiar with the wind. Tyson's tale of wanderlust, loneliness, and yearning is beautifully set in this arrangement. The easy-going folk-song style is an interesting challenge when arranging familiar songs, and Larry Nickel has proven himself once again. It's always a pleasure to sing Larry's arrangements.

Northwest Passage (Stan Rogers, arranged by Ron Smail) [4:32]

Solos by: John Madden, Keith Tipples, Ken Cairnie, Victor Boudreau

With Canada being a vast tract of unexplored territory, especially through the perilous sea and islands of the Canadian Arctic, it was vital that the early Canadians become brave trail-blazers. Rogers' Northwest Passage is a great history lesson set to proud and steadfast music. Once again, Ron Smail demonstrates his mastery of the male chorus arrangement taking Rogers' fine song writing and making it as interesting for the singer as it is pleasing to the listener - and inspiring for both. Rogers said of this song "It is yet another metaphor for the ordinary person achieving the heroic"

$\textbf{Frobisher Bay}^{\S} \text{ (Words and music by James Gordon, arranged by Diane Lomer) [4:57]} \\ \textit{Solo by Pat Matthews}$

This selection is placed purposely after *Northwest Passage*, for the experience of life on the sea is not always cause for pride and celebration. James Gordon tells the tale from a more desolate perspective. The sailors in *Frobisher Bay* have been on a whale hunt, and for the sake of "one more whale" find themselves trapped in the sea ice with limited provisions, and no means of transportation to, or communication with, the world beyond the frozen waters of Frobisher Bay.

Vive La Canadienne (Traditional, arranged by Chris Denby) [2:11]

Steve's brother Chris wrote this arrangement while studying at the University of Western Ontario and offered the arrangement when Steve approached him seeking music for his first recording project with the Bison Men's Chorus "He(a)rd in Manitoha" (2000). With his permission we have included the same recording on this album since it fits so perfectly with our theme of "Canadiana". Vive la Canadienne (Long live the Canadian girl) was identified in 1859 as a 'mélodie nationale canadienne' or, roughly translated, a "Canadian National anthem".

O Canada was declared our first and only official national anthem in 1967.

Wood River $^{\text{II}}$ (Words and music by Connie Kaldor, arranged by Willi Zwozdesky) [4:37] Solo by $^{\text{Iim}}$ House

Connie Kaldor is a Juno Award winner, and in 2007 was named to the Order of Canada for her contributions to Canadian Folk Music as well as her humanitarian and charity-based work. This beautiful tune elicits the image of the lazy *Wood River* meandering its way through Gravelbourg and the southern part of Saskatchewan, bringing its own form of peace, joy and serenity to all who want or need to partake in its existence. The Wood River eventually empties into Old Wives' Lake, and as Connie says "I mean, why rush if you're going to an Old Wives' Lake?!"

O Canada[§] (Arranged by Steve Denby) [1:15]

The Bison Men had already recorded this arrangement of *O Canada* when there came (out of nowhere) the suggestion that the words of our anthem needed to be changed *again!* Ultimately, there was no change in the works for our official national anthem, so we didn't have to redo our recording. Although our national anthem is generally played at the beginning of major events, we think that it is appropriate that we close the circle on this project with the song which is ever in the minds and on the lips of all Canadians.



The Chorus - a brief history

The Bison Men's Chorus was formed in September of 1985 by **Prof. Larry Paterson** of the U of M Faculty of Education. The stated goal of the newly formed group was "to foster University and community relations, heighten visibility of the University and provide expanded choral opportunities for university students, faculty and staff, and men of the community". The membership that year first numbered 26, mostly University staff and students (six of those original members still sing with the chorus). Over the years that number has grown to full roster of 54 with members coming from all walks of life, from all parts of Winnipeg. Larry Patterson served as director of the Chorus from the outset until his retirement in 1997. The Chorus' first accompanist was Jean Graham, wife of then and current chorister Lane Graham.

Not long after its inception the Chorus became officially affiliated with the U of M School of Music (now the Marcel A. Desautel Faculty of Music) as an Ensemble. This means (among other things) that music students can gain performance credits toward their degree by singing with the Bison Men for a season. The School/Faculty has provided invaluable support to the Chorus ever since.

In 1987 the Chorus initiated its first major fund-raising event. A Feeste of Christmas has become an annual tradition for the Chorus and its dedicated band of followers. Each year the Chorus hosts a medieval-style dinner complete with costumed choristers, entertainment, good food and a warm and family-like beginning to the Christmas season.

Over the years the Chorus has participated in a number of significant events. In 1988 the Chorus was a finalist in the CBC National Radio Competition for Amateur Choirs and in 1990 participated in the Pacific International Festival of Male Choirs in Vancouver, BC. as well as a joint concert with Winnipeg's renowned Ron Paley Trio.

1995 saw the Chorus travel to St. Paul, Minnesota to sing in the Music Traditions - Associated Male Choruses of America Concert with the 3M Male Chorus and the Unisys Chorus among other. That year also took the Chorus to Banff, Alberta to participate in the Canadian Rocky Mountain Festival.

With Larry Patterson's retirement in 1997 **Reno Gerl** took over the position of director. That same season saw **Cary Denby** appointed to the position of accompanist. Happily, she has been with us ever since. In 1998 the Chorus began what was to become a long-standing relationship with **Concert Choir of the University of Minnesota at Morris**. That year the Bison Men went to Morris, MN to sing with the Concert Choir. There have been at least 4 reciprocal visits between the two choirs in the years since.

In 1999 Steve Denby (yes, Cary's husband) was appointed director of the Chorus. Steve's high standards, great sense of fun, friendly cajoling and consummate professionalism has continued to challenge and motivate the members to ever-higher achievements. In Steve's 10 year (to date) tenure the Chorus has produced 3 CDs (He(a)rd in Manitoba, He(a)rd at Christmas and this CD) and, in addition to a regular seasonal performance schedule, has been involved in a number of fairly major projects. These include: The Creation, by Haydn with the University of Manitoba Symphony Orchestra, University of Manitoba Singers and the University Women's Choir; Mendelssohn's oratorio Elijah with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, University of Manitoba Singers and the University Women's Choir; Sister Cities Concert with The Setegaya Citizen Chorus of Setegaya, Japan (Setagaya and Winnipeg are sister cities).

The 2008/2009 season saw a real milestone in the Chorus' history. That year the Chorus received an unusual and unexpected request. After a very brief discussion among the members it was decided that the gender of the male-range voice was irrelevant, so that season music student **Vanessa Unrau** joined the Chorus to lend her lovely voice to the (often too small) first tenor section.

With the 2009/2010 season being our 25th season the Chorus has collaborated with several other Winnipeg area male choirs to hold a symposium entitled **BROTHERS IN HARMONY**, **A Celebration of Male Voices in Winnipeg**. This weekend symposium will culminate with a gala concert featuring all six choirs and a massed choir performance of several pieces under the renowned choral conductor **Brainerd Blyden-Taylor** of the **Nathaniel Dett Chorale**. The participating choirs will be: the **Bison Men's Chorus**, the **Faith and Life Male Choir**, the **Golden Chordsmen Chorus**, the **Hoosli Ukrainian Male Chorus**, the **Winnipeg Boy's Choir** and the **Winnipeg Male Chorus**.

Steve Denby - Director

Steve has been teaching music in the public school system since graduating from the University of Manitoba in 1989. After teaching music for 12 years at École River Heights School, he moved to J. H. Bruns Collegiate where he continues to teach Choir, Band, Guitar, Jazz Band, Vocal Jazz, Jazz Guitar, Chamber Choir and Technical Music Production.

Steve is an alumnus of the University Singers under the direction of Henry Engbrecht, and has co-directed the Central Manitoba Youth Choir. He has served as a clinician for both the Vocal Jazz and Choral events at Choralfest.

Steve actively participates in less formal music-making, playing and singing with several different groups including an 80's rock group with his brother Chris, an eclectic acoustic/electric ensemble with friends and colleagues, singing with "The Riffs" (a five-voice male acapella group), and generally "jamming" with family and friends whenever the opportunity arises.


Cary Denby - Accompanist
