

### Research Writing for Graduate Students (ESLC 0210/0112)

# **Course Description**

Graduate students develop and refine advanced writing skills, including analyzing discourse patterns common in graduate level writing. Students study a variety of academic genres to better understand the nature of research writing. Advanced academic phrasing and grammatical structures are also examined. Self and peer-editing skills will be developed throughout the course. For graduate students only.

# **Course Objectives**

Students who successfully complete this course will be better equipped to:

- Identify how texts are structured in terms of functional stages or moves
- Identify the features which characterize texts and realize their communicative purposes
- Demonstrate understanding of cohesion and coherence
- Identify and use academic language on the discourse level
- Discover and demonstrate techniques for self-editing written documents
