Direct Entry applicants must meet both the general <u>and</u> program specific admission requirements.

- General: 5 x courses at 40 S, G, U or C level
- Program-specific: 4 x academic 40S courses with minimum average
- Use the admission requirements chart and 40S academic course guide for assistance
- Some competitive programs may require higher than minimum averages





Some of your students may need to meet English Language Proficiency requirements when applying.

#### **Common ELP waivers include:**

- English 40S with minimum grade of 75%
- Three consecutive years of high school in Canada (Grade 10, 11, 12 transcripts required)

#### **ELP Test Options:**

Added Duolingo test for Fall 2024





- No need to apply to both a Direct Entry faculty AND University 1 – U1 offered automatically to DE faculty applicants who are not selected
- Encourage your students to use an email address they check regularly
- Admission decisions for DE faculties are made in May and are based on first term final, and second term interim grades.
- Manitoba high school students who apply before March 1 are not required to submit transcripts (unless needed for ELP waiver)





- Fall 2024 applications available in October
- Application demo video available on the counsellor resource page
- Music application deadline: January 15
- Direct entry application deadline: March 1
- Application fee of \$100 CDN (\$120 CDN for international) must be paid for application to be considered complete
- Admission decisions released in May/June

# How we support students

\$3.5 million in entrance scholarships and \$30+ million in awards annually to new and current students!

# **Entrance scholarships**

- Apply for admission by March 1 to be automatically considered
- Eligibility: minimum 85% average across five Grade 12 (40S) courses from our approved scholarship course list
- List of approved courses: umanitoba.ca/counsellors
- Amounts awarded vary based on average: \$1,000 -\$3,000 CDN (one-time award, non-renewable)
- Awarded based on final first term & midterm second term grades (not adjusted on final grades)
- Students must enroll in an 80% minimum course load in their first year to hold this scholarship (24 credit hours – over fall & winter terms)





# Leader of Tomorrow

# **BMO Leader of Tomorrow & Indigenous Leader of Tomorrow Entrance Scholarships**:

Application available in October and due by December 1st

- Eligibility:
  - Minimum 90% average on final select 30S grades
  - Demonstrated evidence of leadership qualities, future potential and a high level of communication skills
  - Active record of community/school involvement
- \$16,000 (\$4,000/year over 4 years)
- Applicants must complete an application for admission (and pay the application fee) and the LOT/ILOT scholarship application by Dec. 1





# Leader of Tomorrow

#### **BMO Leader of Tomorrow & Indigenous Leader of Tomorrow Entrance Scholarships**:

- <u>Apply online</u> principal and 2 individual references to be submitted via the online application
- Dedicated email addresses for application inquiries:
  - LOTawards@umanitoba.ca
  - ILOTawards@umanitoba.ca
- Reminder: applicants must complete an application for admission (and pay the application fee) and the LOT/ILOT scholarship application by Dec. 1
- Interviews for selected candidates will take place in March
- Encourage students to apply -- not limited to one candidate per school





# **Tips and reminders!**

- Canada Student Loans are now interest-free under the Canada Student Financial Assistance Program
- Manitoba and Canada have integrated their student loan programs to create a "one student, one loan" model
- MB residents still apply through "Manitoba Student Aid"
- Students should apply for loans as soon as online apps become available - in June (all links on our website)





# **Tips and reminders!**

- Encourage students to create a personal portfolio of their accomplishments and to seek out and apply for any awards or scholarships they may be eligible for – many awards and bursaries are undersubscribed!
- \$1,000 Chown Centennial Entrance Scholarship you choose the student! (Due: June 30)
- Multiple scholarships and bursaries available for UM applicants in May/June – attend our spring counsellor event for details
- UM General Bursary program opens August 1<sup>st</sup> and due October 1<sup>st</sup>. Students apply in their Aurora student accounts, over \$6 million disbursed!










# What is an academic accommodation?

- A different way of doing a task
- Uses strengths to work around barriers
- Levels the playing field without lowering the standards or compromising the integrity of a program





#### Accommodations, when essential to facilitate, should remove unnecessary academic or environmental barriers.

#### Therefore, a barrier is...

Anything within the academic and/or campus environment that interferes with a student's ability to:

- Fully engage and participate in the same activities;
- Utilize the same information shared with everyone;
- Have the same opportunity to achieve;
- Enjoy the same campus services, benefits and experiences as a person without a disability.

# High school vs. university

#### High school

- Accommodations are often determined by IEP
- Modifications to the course may be offered based on the IEP
- Teachers are often more involved (sending reminders, study notes, etc.)
- · Parents may be more involved

#### University

- Accommodations determined by disability documentation from a registered health professional
- Essential requirements must be demonstrated, modifications are not available
- Student is expected to be independent
- Parental involvement needs student consent



# **Common academic accommodations**

- Test and exam accommodations
  - Extra time, alternate space, etc.
- Volunteer note-taking services
- Sign language interpretation (ASL) and transcription service
- Extensions
- Assistive technology
- Alternate formats for course material
- Academic attendant





# Confidentiality



- Student signs a confidentiality and consent form
- Medical documentation, including diagnosis, is not shared unless the student provides written consent
- Standards set by FIPPA and PHIA are followed
- Letters of accommodation are sent to instructors at the request of the student



# **Steps in provision of services**

- Student registers with SAS
- Student provides documentation
  - Assessment from a registered health professional
- Partnership between student/faculty/SAS
- Accessibility Coordinators
  - Create individualized accommodation plan based on documentation, expertise on best practices and standard accommodations
  - Uphold academic standards (e.g. essential skills and technical abilities, bona fide academic requirements)
