USEFUL TIP: To Order Textbooks Online

The Fort Garry bookstore is currently open for online shopping **only** with an option for in-store pickup ... by selecting "*Pick Up at Store*" during checkout. Follow these steps:

- 1) Go to the UM online textbook order page http://bookstore.umanitoba.ca/SelectTermDept
- **2)** Type the 13-digit book number (**ISBN**) of that particular textbook you would like to order, in the "*Search for book*" slot and hit ENTER. You can also type the title of the book but using the ISBN for searching produces the right edition of the textbook.

USEFUL TIP: Hold Lockers

There is a contactless physical material pickup process that UM Libraries introduced to enable students to borrow books in the event Libraries are closed due to COVID-19.

Follow these steps to place a 'request' online:

- 1) Use Library Search (https://umanitoba.ca/libraries/) to find items in the UM collections
- 2) Once you have the search results, make sure you **sign in** to request items (use your email username without @myumanitoba.ca as your UMNet ID and the password)
- 3) Click on the **title** of the desired item
- 4) Scroll down to "Get it"
- 5) Click "Request"
- **6)** In the "Pick up location", select "Elizabeth Dafoe Library Hold Locker" since the book you're looking for is located at Elizabeth Dafoe Library.

That's all. When your item is ready, you will receive an email notification detailing how to pick them up from Dafoe Library located at the Fort Garry campus.
