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

As Rector of St. Paul's College (SPC), I am pleased to present our Annual Report for the 2015-16 academic year. On the cover and throughout the report are the faces of our very accomplished students, faculty, staff, and alumni. I hope you find this report interesting, including these highlights:

- In 2015, 1,138 University of Manitoba (U of M) students joined SPC, with a record breaking total of 214 SPC students graduating with their university degrees.
- Our students continue to use SPC as a springboard for launching successful careers. This includes 247 students in the Arts and Humanities, 250 in Sciences, and 116 in Business. Many of our students are also in Law, Health Sciences, Engineering, Music, Education, etc.
- With an enrollment of 324 students last year, students come from across campus to enroll in Catholic Studies offered by the Jesuit Centre for Catholic Studies at SPC.
- The Joint MA with the University of Winnipeg and PhD program in Peace and Conflict Studies are thriving programs housed in the Arthur V. Mauro Centre for Peace and Justice. Many scholarships are provided by the College's Foundation with donor support.



In creating this report, our College acknowledges tremendous support from the U of M's Office of Institutional Analysis and Registrar's Office, with special thanks to Randy Roller, Wen Trask, and Shan Rogers. In addition to the College's Mission Statement, at St. Paul's College we value each person, the community, social justice, the search for truth by faith and reason, and ecumenical and inter-religious dialogue.

St. Paul's College operates with the following goals and objectives:

- 2. To offer educational programs of the highest possible quality with a particular emphasis on programs and courses in Catholic thought.
- 3. To enhance student success by fostering an environment conducive to intellectual, personal, and spiritual growth.

St. Paul's College is a liberal arts college, which expresses the Christian, Catholic, and Jesuit heritage.

Since St. Paul's College is a Christian college, it encourages active involvement of individuals interested in the study of human reality from the perspective of the Christian heritage. This perspective holds that the individual is a self-transcending unity of body and spirit, which is open to the mystery of God, a mystery most fully communicated in Jesus Christ.

St. Paul's College is specifically a Catholic college; therefore it encourages the active involvement of individuals interested in the study of human reality from the perspective of the Catholic heritage. This provides the perceptions of Christian realist philosophy, and of sacramental, mediational, and communal Catholic theology.

Since St. Paul's College is grounded in the Jesuit educational tradition, it encourages the active involvement of individuals interested in the application of the Ignatian worldview to the study of human reality. This perspective views the temporal and spiritual as interwoven and fosters the study of secular and religious subjects conjointly in order that human excellence might be expressed in men and women of right principles, in touch with their times, and in tune with their culture. It is precisely this Ignatian worldview, which integrates and justifies the Ethos of St. Paul's College in conformity with its mission and aims.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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STUDENT MEMBERSHIP

- A total of 1,138 University of Manitoba students registered as members of St. Paul's College, as recorded at November 1, 2015.
- In 2015, 214 student members of St. Paul's College graduated from the University of Manitoba. Thirty-nine students graduated at the Fall Convocation and 175 students graduated at the Spring Convocation.
- In 2015, 847 of the eligible 1,096 student members, or 77% of students returning to the University of Manitoba in the 2015-16 academic year continued as College members.
- In the 2015-2016 regular academic year, the majority of St. Paul's College students were enrolled in Arts (22%), Science (22%) and University 1 (13%).
- In the 2015-16 regular academic year, the gender composition of St. Paul's College membership comprised 52% males and 48% females.

COURSE OFFERINGS

• In the 2015-16 regular academic year, a wide range of courses from 14 faculties and schools were offered at St. Paul's College with a total of 151 course and tutorial sections of which 47 courses were taught by College faculty members.

AREA OF EMPHASIS

- In the 2015-16 academic year St. Paul's College (through the U of M) offered a Catholic Studies program and a PhD program in Peace and Conflict Studies.
- The Ph.D. Program in Peace and Conflict Studies is now in its seventh year of implementation. In 2015-2016, there were 13 graduate course sections of Peace and Conflict Studies.
- The B.A. (Minor) in Catholic Studies is now in its fifteenth year of implementation. In 2015-2016, there were three offerings of CATH 1190 in the Fall (enrollment of 153) and three offerings of CATH1190 in the Winter (enrollment of 171) for a total of 324 students, one offering of CATH 2000 with 25 students, one offering of CATH 2200 with 17 students, one offering of CATH 2400 with 14 students, and one offering of CATH 3900 (the capstone of the Catholic Studies minor) with 14 students. Enrollment in the Catholic Studies minor has also tripled in 2015-16, with 10 minors now registered.

FACULTY MEMBERSHIP

As of November 5, SPC faculty membership included:

- 26 individuals holding regular membership status
- Eight individuals holding associate membership status
- Ten individuals holding research fellow status
- One visiting scholar
- Eight senior scholars





Chart 2: U of M Enrollment (2010-15 | at November 1)





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

INTRODUCTION

We gratefully acknowledge financial support for St. Paul's College (SPC) Campus Ministry programs and services from the Archdiocese of Winnipeg, St. Paul's College Foundation Inc., as well as other donors. Without this support, much of the services we provide to those within our community would not be possible. The St. Paul's College Students' Association, as in the past, has been very supportive with collaborating in campus ministry and special College liturgies and events. Through their gift of money last summer we were able to purchase our own LCD projector which has been used for several student events since then. We express our appreciation to all.

In his proclamation of the Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis referred to the importance of instruction and formation which opens up the eyes of students to Jesus Christ and the fullness of the Gospel, not only as an intellectual endeavour but as a formation of heart and soul. This formation is the basis of the spiritual and pastoral care of our campus ministry. Much of our time is spent assisting the students with moral and spiritual concerns related to the integrity of their being as they pursue their academic and professional aspirations. This is our ministry priority. We note that there are mental health issues with students on campus. With the help of the Chaplains' Association and the Student Counselling Centre we are able to provide referrals for assistance when needed. We note, however, that there is often a waiting list that students are put on while they continue to struggle. We seek to offer a compassionate place for them as much as our resources can offer. The St. Paul's College campus ministry team collaborates sincerely and joyfully in the service of the Gospel.

Our continued membership and collaboration with the Canadian Catholic Campus Ministry Association and the Canadian Catholic Students' Association is a stimulus for offering integral, competent, human and spiritual resources to students and staff who are searching for the "magis" characteristic of Ignatian spirituality. Evangelization is a key component of our ministry but always within the necessary comprehensive dimensions of campus presence, catechesis, community involvement, ecumenical and interfaith involvement, a culture of vocations, faith community and hospitality, justice and service, leadership development, lectures and retreats, pastoral care, and prayer and sacraments. We continue to invite the students to be creative and come up with ideas of activities and events that they can take responsibility for in a way that meets their needs.

Sr. Elaine Baete continues to be a member of the Global Connections Social Justice Committee (Canadian Catholic Campus Ministry (CCCM) and the Professional Development committee of the CCCM. Meetings were held through Skype. Through the local Catholic Students' Association, student volunteers met twice each term. A community of friendship and support is established through their activities, and they are encouraged to organize events and hone their leadership skills. Among our students are executive members of the Students for a Culture of Life and the CFC-Youth for Christ who are a dynamic part of our campus ministry program.

Annual Review



THE CAMPUS MINISTRY TEAM

The 2015-2016 SPC Campus Ministry team members collaborate very well. We are grateful for the two Peer Campus Assistants, Wadzie Magabwa and Nathania Frederica, who assisted the director of campus ministry with outreach to students. They received a stipend for their help with liturgy and various activities including university orientation assistance. Meetings with them were usually held monthly and as needed, depending on specific activities and events that required planning. Meetings were also held with the students of CFC Youth for Christ as we organized some activities together.





SPIRITUAL LIFE AND DEVELOPMENT

After summer break, weekly 11:00 am Sunday Mass resumed August 23rd, 2015. Masses continued until June 26th, 2016. Weekday Mass resumed Tuesdays to Fridays at 11:45 am from August 26, 2015 and continued to June 27th. We celebrated Christmas Eve Mass on December 24th, 2015 at 8:00 pm and closed the chapel until Sunday Mass resumed January 3th, 2016.

We are grateful to the Jesuits who presided over weekday liturgies when Fr. Michael Koryluk had other commitments. On February 10th 2016 the Ash Wednesday Mass with Distribution of the Ashes was held with a large gathering in Christ the King Chapel. Thanks to Fr. Eduardo Soto SJ who assisted at this Mass.

In addition to Easter Triduum liturgies (March 24-26th, 2016) with Holy Thursday, Good Friday Way of the Cross on Campus, Good Friday The Passion of the Lord Service, and Easter Vigil, special liturgical celebrations held in the chapel included: the Mass of the Holy Spirit (September 27, 2015), the St. Paul's Day Mass (January 24, 2016), and the Baccalaureate Mass (April 24, 2016), all presided over by Fr. Michael Koryluk, followed by the Academic Awards Ceremonies and the Baccalaureate Exercises. We are thankful for the assistance of the Jesuits and Deacon Richard Ludwick of the SPC Board of Governors.

There was one wedding in Christ the King the Chapel (on June 27th 2015) of a SPC member-international student. No funerals were held in the Chapel.

Workshops were offered to students who expressed interest in being a part of our liturgical celebrations as lectors of the Word of God.

Fr. Michael was available regularly for the Sacrament of Reconciliation, special liturgies such as Advent and Lent, as well as penitential liturgies and celebrations. On the First Fridays of the month, we had Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament after the 11:45am mass until 3:30pm.

Members of our faith community participated in the various Centennial celebrations of the Archdiocese. We were happy to host the Vespers for the Academic Symposium entitled "The Archdiocese of Winnipeg at 100: Yesterday, Today and tomorrow" on October 22nd 2015. Happy to celebrate the diversity of our Catholic faith and worship, we welcomed our Byzantine brothers and sisters for liturgy. Fr. Taras, Redemptorist, presided over this liturgy on November 19th, 2015, and April 14th 2016. These liturgies have been formative for many young people who have not experienced this dimension of our Catholic faith.

On Sunday September 20th 2015 we celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Vatican Document of Sacrosanctum Concilium with a special liturgy followed by a reception.

INTERCULTURAL LITURGIES

In keeping with the call for intercultural dialogue in Catholic education, we welcomed the initiative the students took to organize liturgies in their culture and language, with translation available through the Sunday Bulletin. On December 13th, 2015, we celebrated Hispanic Mass in the spirit of Our Lady of Guadalupe-thanks to the assistance of Fr. Eduardo Soto, SJ, and African Mass (January 17th, 2016) organized by the African students of our faith community. Both were followed by a potluck meal. The CFC Youth for Christ organized the Filipino Mass and pot luck meal February 7th 2016.

READING & DISCUSSION ON THE GOSPEL OF LUKE FOR THE YEAR OF MERCY

Following the pastoral letter of Archbishop Richard Gagnon, a lectio devina reading on the Gospel of Luke was offered to students. Due to the academic demands on the students only irregular gatherings of 1-2 students were held.

BARN MASS (DECEMBER 6TH, 2015)

The Barn Mass was held at the Giesbrecht Farm near Niverville. This Advent liturgy provides the framework to help prepare for the coming of Jesus that we celebrate at Christmas.

NATIONAL CATHOLIC STUDENTS' WEEK

CFC Campus Based Youth offered Bible Studies and organized a Filipino Mass with a pot-luck meal as part of this week's festivities on campus. The usual Winnipeg Harvest volunteering coinciding with National Catholic Students' Week was postponed to April 2nd 2016. Fifteen students participated.

RITES OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)

One student desired to be confirmed with catechesis through Campus Ministry; his sibling wanted confirmation at St. Vital Parish. We encouraged them to decide in unison. One other student of ICM asked for the RCIA process much too late to start the year. We hope he will respond and be committed to the process next year.

Thanks to a generous donor, Sr. Elaine and one student were able to participate in the Music Ministry Alive liturgy camp at St. Katherine's University in St. Paul MN from July 28 to August 2nd 2015. Given that formation for liturgy is needed, it would be ideal if more students could participate in this

liturgical formation workshop.

LITURGY-BASED BIBLE STUDY

The CFC Campus Based youth faith group has organized within SPC and off campus a faith sharing and Bible Study gathering about every second or third week. About 15-20 students usually attend.

Thanks to the Catholic Foundation we were able to respond to a request that arose from the Anima Christi Retreat in October to provide a weekend retreat workshop on March 11-12th through the DVD series of Christopher West. With the collaboration and support of the Jesuit Centre for Catholic Studies of St. Paul's College, 18 students registered and provided very positive feedback.

SPIRITUAL EXERCISES OF ST IGNATIUS IN DAILY LIFE [ANNOTATION 19]

Currently two students are faithfully journeying through this demanding year-round retreat. These daily prayer exercises help individuals grow in their relationship with the Lord and develop a sense of discernment in their lives.

VOCATION DISCERNMENT RETREAT (OCTOBER 2ND-4TH, 2015) AND VOCATION DISCUSSION EVENING: (NOVEMBER 17TH, 2015)

As part of the Archdiocese of Winnipeg Centennial celebrations Sr. Elaine collaborated with Christian Martinez and committee members to organize the successful discernment retreat held at St. Benedict's. Archbishop LeGatt of St. Boniface financially supported a Vocation Discussion Evening that was held in Hanley Hall on November 17th, with about 20 students participating. We are committed to assisting young people discern their vocation: single life, marriage, priesthood and consecrated/religious life.

As one of the several means of support of vocation promotion, Sr. Elaine Baete is on the organizing committee of the National Association of Vocation and Formation Directors Association (NAVFDA) of Canada conference that is being hosted in Winnipeg at the Clarion Hotel from April 25th to 28th inclusive. Fr. Michael Koryluk will be presiding over the main liturgy, representing the Archdiocese of Winnipeg.

ECUMENICAL & INTERFAITH

We continued our meetings, prayer celebrations and outreach activities with other members of the Chaplains' Association of the University of Manitoba on and off campus. SPC Campus Ministry has a good working relationship with the U of M Student Affairs Chaplains' Association. We hosted the first gathering on October 7th, 2015. A few members of our community participated in different gatherings during the Festival of Prayer-Week of Christian Unity (January 17th -24th 2016). Sr. Elaine and some students volunteered at the Chaplains' Association PB & Jam event for the Boys and Girls Club of Winnipeg on March 16th.

Members of our community were present at the Hillel Students' Association Interfaith-Passover Seder Meal and tour (April 3rd, 2016) at the Shaarey Zedek Synagogue.

CULTS & RELIGIOUS MOVEMENTS

We are aware that cults and unhealthy religious movements can appear campus. We work with the University of Manitoba Chaplains' Association and Campus Security in this regard. Fortunately, there have been no events of this nature.

U OF M STUDENT AFFAIRS CHAPLAINS' ASSOCIATION

Our campus ministry team expressed the desire to be more visible and available to students throughout campus, especially at University Centre. The Rector, Dr. Adams, is very supportive in continuing the dialogue in this regard.

OUTREACH & SOCIAL JUSTICE

In expressing his concern for the education and formation of young people and students, Pope Francis said that "Catholic education cannot be done without speaking about humanity... to educate in a Christian manner is to lead young people ... forward in those human values present in all that is real and one of these realities is transcendence." In an informal manner, campus ministry has sought to offer accompaniment to students in the formation of their intellect, heart, and hands in outreach and service. We do all of this within the framework of the Catholic principles of social teaching and the spiritual and corporeal works of mercy, working for life, for development, for the dignity of the person, and to stand for authentic values in the challenges encountered daily in a manner consistent with the Gospel. In this spirit, we offer activities to and for students, and encourage them to take initiative by reaching out. Debriefing amongst the campus ministers and students before and after these experiences is one of the many ways that "accompaniment" in educative formation helps to internalize the transcendent values more fruitfully.

STONY MOUNTAIN INSTITUTION (SMI) MONTHLY OUTREACH (SEPTEMBER 26, 2015–FEBRUARY 28, 2016)

Fifteen students and alumni were committed to the outreach at SMI. A few others had to withdraw after getting employment. Preparations for these monthly visits involved participation in an orientation session, as well as reflection and sharing on liturgical readings.

DEVELOPMENT & PEACE (D&P)

This year, two students and two alumni participated in D&P Fall Action workshops and provided resources to our community. The focus was Pope Francis' Encyclical Laudato Si. In addition to regular donations received for D&P for Solidarity Sunday, a collection was taken in support of the Share Lent campaign and forwarded to the head office to help those in need.

STUDENTS FOR A CULTURE FOR LIFE (PRO-LIFE)

A group of Catholic, ecumenical and interfaith students on campus are organized as a pro-life group. Some of these students collaborate in the Catholic Students' Association meetings. One of the activities of collaboration is the Advent collection of goods to support expectant mothers at Villa Rosa. Donations, financial and material, have been forwarded to them. We also promoted events such as the March for Life and Family Life Week. As part of encouraging the "consistent ethic of life" we are encouraging students to take a stand for life against assisted suicide and encourage attendance in the lectures made available on campus and at venues within Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG HARVEST VOLUNTEERING

Traditionally the kick-off event for National Catholic Students' Week is in February, however we were obliged to postpone it to early April 2016. Fifteen students participated. We collect non-perishable food items and give them to our own students in need or to the U of M Students' Food Bank hamper for other students in need.

INNER CITY MINISTRY & OTHER VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Several students have been motivated to volunteer in various parts of the city and we encourage them to do so. Some assisted at Agape Table and Siloam Mission. A couple of students continue to volunteer at the Victoria Hospital, Misericordia Health Centre, and Deer Lodge. We have a good working relationship with the Archeparchy of Winnipeg through the Redemptorist 'Welcome Home' on Euclid Avenue. Ten students volunteered for the December 13th 2015 Gift Wrapping Bee for inner city children before Christmas. We also collected items (socks, mitts, scarves, hotel soaps, and shampoos) for 'Our Place Chez Nous Drop-In Centre Inc.' on Main Street.

AMAZING RACE-AMAZING GRACE SERVICE LEARNING Social Justice Awareness (February 17-19 2016)

Members of the campus ministry team (along with five students) took advantage of the Jubilee Year of Mercy and visited the Churches with Holy Doors in each of the three dioceses in Winnipeg. These visits included daily reviews and discussions of the Catholic principles of social teaching, as well as discussions concerning the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. This was an active and prayerful social justice week. Prayerful visits and tours were made to St. Mary's Cathedral, St. Giana Beretta Molla Church, St. Andrew Babola Church and St. Boniface Cathedral. Service and learning opportunities took place at Agape Table, The Welcome Home and l'Arche Winnipeg.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

Building community with healthy human development and relationships is crucial to the formation of young people into mature Christians during their academic pursuits. The students who voluntarily comprise the local Catholic Students' Association are given the freedom and responsibility to take leadership roles in organizing events. The Coffee House is one such event (November 7, 2015 & March 5, 2016). One movie night was held in each term (Not My Life and The Francis Effect).




