As an economics student in the Faculty of Arts, you will study the history and current reality of these issues. The commitment of the department to a broad range of perspectives has stimulated the development of a variety of interdisciplinary programs including the global political economy and labour studies programs. The department of economics also offers joint honours programs in collaboration with the departments of mathematics and statistics.

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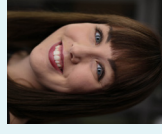
