Fall Term Enrolment

This is the third consecutive record-breaking year for enrolment at the University of Manitoba. As at the official reporting date of November 1, overall enrolment was up 2.0%, to 29,759 students, from 29,181 students last year. This year's increase has been fueled by growth in full-time enrolment. Full-time enrolment increased 2.9%, from 23,811 full-time students in Fall Term 2012 to 24,509 full-time students in Fall Term 2013. Part-time enrolment declined 2.2%, from 5,370 to 5,250.

Undergraduate enrolment increased by 367 students, or 1.5%, to 25,363 students in Fall Term 2013 from 24,996 students in Fall Term 2012. As noted earlier in the term, over the past three years, eight faculties/schools have introduced direct entry. As a result of these changes, inter-faculty comparisons at the undergraduate level should be made with caution.

Graduate enrolment also increased this fall. Graduate enrolment rose 4.7%, to 3,748 students in Fall Term 2013, from 3,580 students in Fall Term 2012.

Credit Hours

Total undergraduate credit hours in Fall Term increased 0.9%. Credit hours in Fall Term 2013 were 276,904 compared to Fall Term 2012 credit hours of 274,487. Credit hours for courses offered through Distance and Online Education grew 6.9%, increasing from 20,607 credit hours to 22,034 credit hours.

International Students

International enrolment increased 18.5% overall, from 3,266 students last year, to 3,870 students this year. Both undergraduate and graduate international enrolments were up, with undergraduate enrolment increasing from 2,398 to 2,888, and graduate enrolment increasing from 810 to 917. As percentages of the student body, international students make up 11.4% of undergraduate students and 24.5% of graduate students.

Aboriginal Students

Aboriginal enrolment grew 2.7%, to 2,140 students in Fall Term 2013 from 2,084 students in Fall Term 2012. Aboriginal students currently make up 7.2% of the student population overall.
