Similar to the rest of the Ukrainian community around the world, the Centre's year was shaped by Russia's atrocious invasion of Ukraine. We, at the Centre and throughout all of Ukraine, continually attempt to inform the world truthfully and accurately about what is transpiring in the homeland.

The Centre was identified as one of the important points of contact for local and national media outlets at the University of Manitoba regarding the Russian invasion of Ukraine; dozens of interviews and comments were provided by myself and the CUCS Policy Council members to various media outlets in attempts to heighten understanding of the plight of our country.

I have also participated in numerous panel discussions such as

Ms. Yuliia Ivaniuk Russia's Buildup Near Ukraine: What are Canada's Interests and Options (Institute for Peace and Diplomacy); Talking Peace: the Russia-Ukraine Crisis (Peace and Conflict Studies Program at the University of Manitoba); Debunking Myths and Managing Expectations (Centre for Defense and Security Studies at the University of Manitoba); Crisis in Ukraine (Brandon University); Russia's War in Ukraine: Historic Background and Canada's Response (Canadian International Council), along with presentations to local schools and organisations.

Due to Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, the University of Manitoba is hosting twenty Ukrainian scholars within the Faculty of Arts, Faculty of Sciences, Faculty of Law, College of the Medicine and other units. The Centre organised a welcome event for the scholars in collaboration with St. Andrew's College that took place on December 1, 2022. Welcoming remarks were extended by the university administration and community leaders. The scholars were given an opportunity to introduce themselves and share their stories. Several community organisations were invited to set up informational booths to inform the attendees of their offerings and various volunteering opportunities. We hope that this event helped enhance opportunities for interdisciplinary research and collaboration between the academia and the community.



The Centre was the first unit within the Faculty of Arts to get approval and successfully launch a letter of participation program. Participants are required to attend a combination of lectures and (or) reading club meetings in order to be eligible to obtain the letter of participation. The lecture series takes place from September until May and covers a wide range of Ukrainian and Ukrainian Canadians topics. Reading club meetings take place on a bimonthly basis and involve a discussion of a new Ukrainian/Ukrainian Canadian book at each session. Thank you to the Canadian Foundation of Ukrainian Studies for their support of our programming.

For a full-time student in any Faculty or School at the University of Manitoba who has completed at least one year of study and has achieved the highest grade point average on at least 12 credit hours of courses with significant Ukrainian cultural content and/or Ukrainian Canadian content, in fields such as History, Political Studies, Slavic Studies, & Ukrainian Studies, and based first on courses within the Ukrainian Canadian Heritage Studies program.

Andrew & Nellie Pawlik Scholarship

For a student doing either a project or internship in the area of Ukrainian Canadian Studies or Ukrainian Heritage Studies at an approved institution who has achieved high academic standing at the University of Manitoba or St. Andrew's College.

Michael & Grace Hykaway Essay Prize

For the best essay in Ukrainian on any topic in the area of Ukrainian Canadian Studies.

John Magrega Memorial Scholarship

For a full-time student in any Faculty or School at the University of Manitoba who has completed at least one year of full-time studies in any degree program in good academic standing who has, in the preceding two academic sessions, achieved the highest combined average on courses offered within the Ukrainian Canadian Heritage Studies program.

Performance Requirements:


Participants will be evaluated based on attendance. Participation in the discussions and Q&A sessions is recommended.


