## **Awards information**

The purpose of these awards is to encourage student interest and research activity in aging. To be eligible to apply, a student must meet the requirements as outlined by the Centre on Aging.

- For the Centre on Aging Betty Havens Memorial Graduate Fellowship and Jack MacDonell Scholarship for Research in Aging: Students enrolled full-time in the Faculty of Graduate Studies, in either the first or second year of a Master's program, or is within the first four years of a doctoral program, and whose research focuses on aging; and is not a recipient of a major award valued at \$10,000 or greater in the year in which the award is tenable.
- For the Barbara Jean Payne Memorial Award in Social Gerontology: Full-time Masters or Ph.D. students, whose studies focus on social gerontology and are attending the University of Manitoba.
- For the Esther and Samuel Milmot Scholarship: Full-time students pursuing a
  program which bears on gerontology either in the Faculty of Arts or in the Faculty of
  Graduate Studies with the principal field of study in a department of the Faculty of
  Arts, University of Manitoba.
- For the Alzheimer Society Fellowship Awards: Full-time Masters; post-graduate
  medical program (medical residents electing to take a year off from residency to
  pursue full-time research); or Ph.D. students, whose studies focus on the area of
  Alzheimer's disease and other dementias, attending the University of Manitoba or
  attending universities in Manitoba.
