History 3780 Public History Fall Term 2013 Tuesday 2.30pm-5.30pm St John's College room 115.

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Office Hours - Thursday 10am-11.30 or anytime by appointment.

This course will introduce students to the practice of history in the public domain. It will also offer the opportunity to explore a variety of careers in History beyond the classroom and to meet with professionals working in these fields in Manitoba. This term it will include examination of the issues of memory and representation in museum exhibits, historic sites, historic houses, archives and historical journals and will include several site visits to provincial institutions and organisations.

Students will be exposed to some of the fields of material history studies (selected from food history, dress, architecture, furniture and interiors) and may have the opportunity to conduct oral interviews as part of their course work.

PLEASE NOTE: Several classes will meet off campus and students should be prepared to calculate travel time into their schedule. It will be difficult to have other classes or obligations immediately before or after History 3780.

Topics and themes will be selected from:

- 1. Museum Studies historical representation; Memorials and memory; museums and the state; community museums; eco museums; the historic house; museums and public discourse; ICOM and museum practice.
- 2. Material history studies; commodities and global trade patterns; material culture and daily life.
- 3. Archival Studies an introduction
- 4. Historic Landscape planning, National Parks System, role of tourism.
- 5. The' Amateur' and the 'Professional', heritage and history and the role of local historical societies; the uses of the past in everyday life.
- 6. The place of exhibit design, audience and evaluation.

Proposed Course Requirements (this may change depending on course registration-finalised by week 2)

Major Project 20% minimum 10 pages (2500 words) long **DUE DATE – Dec. 2**

Final Exam 35% Scheduled during the exam period December 6-18

Reviews 30% each review 5 pages (1250 words) minimum, worth 10% each

DUE DATES are approximate and may change Oct. 15, Nov. 5, Nov. 19

Participation 15% - students will have the opportunity to make oral presentations in class

Students should have a background of some undergraduate history courses and should be prepared to participate in class discussion and in professional meetings.
