They provide "valued services for injury prevention, compensation and return to health and work."</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <u><i>The Workers Compensation Act</i></u></li> </ul>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Report the Injury to Your Supervisor</li> <li>2. Go to a Healthcare Provider</li> <li>3. Report the Injury to the WCB online, via phone, or by mailing in/faxing a Worker Incident Report</li> <li>4. AICAC will provide you with written notice of the hearing date, place and time</p> <p>Alternatively, AICAC offers <u>mediation</u> for certain files</p>	<p>There is no cost to file a Notice of Appeal.</p>
<p><u>Apprenticeship and Certification Appeal Board</u></p>	<p>"The Appeal Board hears appeals about decisions made by the Executive Director of Apprenticeship Manitoba. The Appeal Board operates <b>independently</b> from the Apprenticeship and Certification Board and Apprenticeship Manitoba."</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <u>The Apprenticeship and Certification Act (Act)</u></li> <li>• <u>Appeals Procedure Regulation</u></li> </ul>	<p>File your Notice of Appeal within 30 days after receiving written notice of the decision. Submit <u>this form</u> with your documentation by letter mail or by registered mail</p>	<p>There is no cost to file a Notice of Appeal.</p>
<p><u>Animal Care Appeal Board</u></p>	<p>"The Animal Care Appeal Board is an independent appeal body which hears appeals about animal seizures, orders and adverse licensing decisions, providing open, fair and equitable review of appeal."</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <u>The Animal Care Act</u></li> <li>• <u>Guidelines and Procedures</u></li> </ul>	<p>1. File an appeal by sending a letter (<u>template here</u>) to <u>this address</u></p> <p>2. Appeal Hearing</p> <p>3. Decision</p>	<p>The owner is responsible for all fees associated with the appeal process and veterinary care.</p>

\*"You must provide reasons in writing to AICAC should you file your Notice of Appeal **after** the 90 days. AICAC will ask MPIC for their comments and a hearing may be held to determine if you should be allowed the extension."
