DEAN'S MESSAGE

A decade ends. Another begins. The graduating class of 1980 anticipates with a mixture of apprehension and delight their entry into professional life. The drama of responsible service to client and community looms near. What joys and sadness will it bring? How will personal and professional identity interact? Have the necessary knowledge and skills been properly inculcated? Will the 80's make demands different than those of the decade just past? Is specialization an answer?

These and many other questions are and ought to be raised in the minds of graduates. No longer can one remain consumer and critic alone. For the first time in their lives many of the 1980 Class will be expected to provide legal services of substantial significance and will be accountable for the quality and ethics thereof. There is much of the basic yet to learn and keeping current with new developments will be an even more difficult task. The volume and rapidity of change in our legal system are enormous and both show signs of marked increase in the new decade. It is therefore fundamentally true that graduation from law school marks not the end but the continuation of one's legal education. The process is never ending.

Yet, one need not despair. Conscientious effort at the law school will now be seen to have laid a solid foundation of knowledge, skills and ethical concerns on which a rewarding and competent career can be built. While there may be initial frustrations, the graduate will cope well, as others have before. Experience will add confidence to knowledge and, in the end, the consumer of legal services will benefit.

But there is more. The lawyer's function is not uniquely client oriented. There is also a public trust to be discharged. The lawyer must be constantly aware that he or she fulfills a vital role in the community at large. Knowledge and skill must be applied conscientiously and fairly so that legal services add to, and do not detract from, a social and economic order which is ever more fair and equitable. Avarice, fear, intolerance and oppression ought to be challenged, not supported. Vigilance in law reform efforts must be maintained. The public soul is to be protected and fostered equally with that of the private.

In all of these endeavors, I wish you well.
