WESTERN CANADA MOOT

The faculty of law was very well represented by Shandra Bresoline and Marnie McDonald. They represented the accused, who was charged with murder. His defence was alibi. Our theory of the case was simple: "He wasn't there." Both Shandra and Marnie repeated this theme throughout the trial. They put in a wonderful trial. Marnie used diagrams to make her point in the closing and that was particularly effective for the jury - but not for the judge, who was a traditionalist [other words do come to mind]. In the end Shandra and Marnie were runner-up in the competition. This was good enough to get them to the national trial moot - The Sopinka Cup - in Ottawa.

The first annual Sopinka Cup Trial Moot was held in Ottawa. Eight teams participated: three from the West, two from Ontario, two from the Maritimes and one from Quebec. The Western Canada teams were selected from the Western Canada Moot and the Ontario teams were selected from the Arnup Cup Competition. The same problem was used as for the Western. This time the teams switched sides. We now acted for the Crown. Shandra and Marnie put in a wonderful trial. They made a case out of nothing and following Marnie's closing the consensus in the jury was that the accused, in the words of Justice Chadwick "was going down". In the reception held at the Supreme Court of Canada following the Friday trials, Madam Justice McLachlin when introduced to Marnie said, "You are one of the women from Manitoba who put in the great trial that I've heard so much about." At the end of the day the clear view was that the winner of the competition was either us or the University of Toronto, who acted for the defence. We didn't win, however, we did take home two of the four individual awards: Shandra for best Opening Address and Marnie for best Closing Address. They both received copies of Justice Sopinka's text on evidence. The "women from Manitoba" did us proud.








Mark Adkins


