

Conversation & Discussion (ESLC 0260)

Required Textbook

There is no textbook to be purchased for this course. All class materials will be provided by the instructor.

Course Description

In this 30-hour course, students will practice speaking skills necessary for maintaining conversations and participating in discussions. Practice will include effective questioning and requesting, giving opinions, asking for clarification, and offering suggestions. Common Canadian idioms will also be studied.

Course Objectives

Students who successfully complete this course will be able to:

- Participate more confidently in formal and informal conversations.
- Understand the importance of non-verbal communication.
- Use common phrases and idioms in conversations.
- Question, state opinions, ask for clarification & offer suggestions effectively.
- Participate in academic discussions with more confidence and understanding of cultural norms.

Students will receive a “letter of completion” at the end of this course, providing s/he attends a minimum of 80% of classes (8/10 classes). Please note that there will NOT be a record of this course on your U of M transcript.
