<p>Letter of Permission (LOP)</p>	<p>The Letter of Permission process at the University of Manitoba allows students in degree programs at this University to take courses at other recognized colleges or universities for transfer of credit, provided such courses are approved in advance by the Faculty or School in which they are currently registered. Courses approved on a LOP will be recorded in the 'Transfer Credit' section of a student's official transcript and will be counted towards the Full-Time status for the term that the course is recorded in.</p>
