Your immigration status: What we want you to know!

- 1. Apply to extend your study permit before it expires
- 2. Maintaining your study permit conditions, including impacts of academic standing and allegations of academic misconduct
- 3. Full-time vs. Part-time status
- 4. Authorized leaves
- 5. Temporary resident visa (TRV) validity
- Passport expiry

Level of study	Full-Time Status	Academic year	
Undergraduate	9 credit hours or more per term	Fall & Winter terms (September – April). Summer is optional & not a required term. (exception: Faculty of Nursing)	
Graduate	Full-time regardless of credit hours (exception: MBA program)	terms (September – August). Summer is a required term.

Revision period:

- Can add or remove courses to create a timetable that suits your needs
- Courses that you drop or change will not be added to your academic transcript
- If you drop a course, you don't have to pay for that course

- 1. No tuition refunds
- 2. Can't add courses to record

Fees and deadlines

- Fee must be paid by the deadline each term. If you don't pay fees by the deadline, you will be charged a late fee, and your account will be placed on hold.
- Fee payment deadline: October 2, 2024
- Impacts: not being able to obtain documents for immigration applications; being deregistered from a future term and not meeting the conditions of your study permit & not being eligible to work

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








A graduate student is not allowed to work more than 20 hours/week during the summer term, even if they aren't taking any courses.

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


What is Culture?

Why is Academic Integrity **Important?**

- Foundation of the University
- Gives credibility
- Shows respect for others' ideas
- Shows good practices
- Has broad implications (value of the degree)
- Helps prevent academic misconduct (and the stress of facing an allegation)

Inappropriate Collaboration

Working together with other person(s) on an individual assignment.



















How to Avoid Inappropriate Collaboration

- Make sure that you understand the expectations for appropriate collaboration for each specific assignment. Only your instructor can set these expectations!
- Keep your work separate from other students' work.
- Do not allow another person to directly edit or revise your work.
- Do not give copies of your work (printed or electronic) to another person – you do not know how they will use it

Plagiarism

Taking someone else's idea(s) or words and using them as if they were your own.



In the Western academic system, ideas and words are owned.

















Plagiarism

- Not giving credit to the original author and source of information – text, image, audio, or video;
- Copying-and-pasting information without "..." (quotation marks);
- Trying to paraphrase, but changing only a few words;
- •Referencing sources at the end of a paper, but not using in-text citations throughout the paper;
- Re-using previous writing (self-plagiarism)

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








Using Source Material in Your Writing



















Consequences of Academic Misconduct

- Range of penalties
- Zero on test/assignment
- "F" in course (lowers GPA)
- Comments on transcripts
- Suspensions

Can impact study permit, delay graduation, and cause a mountain of stress!

















Why might students break the rules?

- Unclear/incomplete understanding of the University's rules and expectations
- Assume it is the same as it was in high school, or previous university, or in home country
- Time management issues
 - English as additional language reading/writing take longer
- Difficulties reaching out for help
- Competing values















Scenario #1

Michael was writing his final essay for one of his courses. He used websites and articles from the internet to research his topic. Michael re-wrote in his own words the ideas that he wanted to include in his paper. He did not copy-and-paste any information directly, so he did not include any in-text citations in his paper, only a reference list.

> Why is this a problem? What could the student have done differently?

















Scenario #2

Sarah is re-taking a course that she VW'd from last term. For the past week, she has been distracted because she is worried about her grandmother, who is very ill and in the hospital. Sarah forgets about the first assignment until the day it is due. Then she remembers that last term, before withdrawing from the course, she got high marks on that first assignment. So, she finds her old assignment, changes the date, and submits it to her instructor.

> Why is this a problem? What could the student have done differently?

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Scenario #3

Anna is having trouble writing essays for her courses because English is not her first language. Luckily, she has a friend in her home country who writes very well in English. After Anna writes her essay, she sends it to her friend to fix her mistakes. When Anna gets the file back, she notices that her friend has added some new ideas and re-written parts of her paper. Anna is grateful to her friend and submits the essay to her instructor.

> Why is this a problem? What could the student have done differently?

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Scenario #4

Ben is in the student lounge working on an assignment when he overhears two classmates discussing the same assignment. Ben joins them and they all work through the most challenging part of the assignment together. Each of the three students copy the work onto their respective laptops. Ben completes the remainder of the assignment later that evening and emails it to the instructor.

> Why is this a problem? What could the student have done differently?

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Scenario #5

Mariam is a diligent student who has always excelled in her studies, and she feels immense pressure to perform well on a challenging programming assignment in her computer science course. While researching online, Mariam discovers a generative AI tool that can help her write code. It's late at night and she's tired, so she uses it to generate code and submits the work as her own.

> Why is this a problem? What could the student have done differently?



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

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
