



Why is Academic Integrity Important?

- Foundation of the University
- Gives credibility
- Shows respect for others' ideas
- Shows good practices
- Has broad implications (value of the degree)
- Helps prevent academic misconduct (and the stress of facing an allegation)

Cheating

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Inappropriate Collaboration

Working together with other person(s) on an individual assignment.



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How to Avoid Inappropriate Collaboration

- Make sure that you understand the expectations for appropriate collaboration for each specific assignment. Only your instructor can set these expectations!
- Keep your work separate from other students' work.
- Do not allow another person to directly edit or revise your work.
- Do not give copies of your work (printed or electronic) to another person – you do not know how they will use it

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Plagiarism

Taking someone else's idea(s) or words and using them as if they were your own.



In the Western academic system, ideas and words are owned.

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Plagiarism

- Not giving credit to the original author and source of information – text, image, audio, or video;
- Copying-and-pasting information without "..." (quotation marks);
- Trying to paraphrase, but changing only a few words;
- Referencing sources at the end of a paper, but not using in-text citations throughout the paper;
 - Re-using previous writing (self-plagiarism)









Consequences of Academic Misconduct

- Range of penalties
- Zero on test/assignment
- "F" in course (lowers GPA)
- Comments on transcripts
- Suspensions Can impact study permit, delay graduation, and cause a mountain

of stress!

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Why might students break the rules?

- Unclear/incomplete understanding of the University's rules and expectations
- Assume it is the same as it was in high school, or previous university, or in home country
- Time management issues
 - English as additional language reading/writing take longer
- Difficulties reaching out for help
- Competing values

- Immigration regulations related to your international student status (study permit, working eligibilities, etc)
- Non-academic topics: life in Winnipeg, personal matters

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Your immigration status: What we want you to know!

- 1. Extend your study permit before it expires
- 2. Follow your study permit conditions, including impacts of academic standing and allegations of academic misconduct
- 3. Full-time vs. Part-time status
- 4. Authorized leaves
- 5. Temporary resident visa (TRV) validity
- 6. Passport expiry

















Understanding the UM and your immigration status

Level of study	Full-Time Status	Academic year
Undergraduate per term	9 credit hours or more	Fall & Winter terms (September – April). Summer is optional & not a required term. (exception: College of Nursing)
Graduate	Full-time regardless of credit hours (exception: MBA, MPA program)	Fall, Winter & Summer terms (September – August). Summer is a required term.

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Understanding the UM and your immigration status

Revision period:

- Can add or remove courses to create a timetable that suits your needs
- Courses that you drop, or change will not be added to your academic transcript
- If you drop a course, you don't have to pay for that course
- 1. No tuition refunds
- 2. Can't add courses to record

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Understanding the UM and your immigration status

Fees and deadlines

- Fee must be paid by the deadline each term. If you don't pay fees by the deadline, you will be charged a late fee, and your account will be placed on hold.
- Fee payment deadline: February 5, 2025
- Impacts: not being able to obtain documents for immigration applications; being deregistered from a future term and not meeting the conditions of your study permit & not being eligible to work

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


