Why did you apply to be an ecumenical steward on the United Church website?

Ryan: The spirit just moved me. It was a great opportunity to see the ecumenical movement.

What session did you enjoy?

Ryan: Attending the youth gathering preassembly, the experience of youth ecumenism was interesting. Also, the worship in the giant prayer tent for morning and evening prayer, three hundred and fifty churches were involved, and every worship service was different. I met so many people from different cultures and ideas.

Before attending the Germany Convention, you lived in residence and attended University under COVID restrictions (online classes only). What sustained you at this time?

Ryan: My meetings with the Chaplain of St John's College and attendance at St Paul's Church helped to assuage my anxieties I had. They helped me get through those difficult times.

What did you learn from your experience in Germany?

That there is great value in making an ecumenical effort but not for the sole purpose of converting

In the Fall of 2022 Ryan attended the World's Council of Churches Assembly in Germany (40 Canadians attended). The theme of the assembly was "Christ's love moves the world to reconciliation and unity".

Ryan has attended Catholic church at home and on campus and played organ at various United churches in Winnipeg and at home in Ontario. Therefore, he already had experienced ecumenism for years before his assembly attendance.

I had an interview by Zoom with Ryan in March 2023.

each other but to develop an understanding of inclusivity. It is a way of looking at the world and being exposed to other ways of thinking, but it is a difficult unity though.

The meeting took place in Europe which I felt was ethnocentric, where mixed cultures of the convention split into home groups (15-20 people) who met to discuss what was heard by each person. All over the world, hear people's opinion, and I felt my Canadian multi-cultural experience helped me to be more open than those who came from a mono cultural nation.

You were part of the youth discussions, what was the main topic/concerns of the youth?

Ryan: I was part of the youth pre-assembly discussions, and the focus was on issues of social justice and environment and how Christ's love moves the world towards reconciliation. Justice is different to different people. It was social issues that engaged the youth delegates not theology.

What other things stood out for you?

Ryan: The relationship between the global north and south. The number of Christians continue

to increase in the south and is growing quicker than the north. Yet delegate attendance was dominated by the north. I noticed who was not there. The African representatives are focused on social justice issues and speak with one voice.

The sharing of stories face to face allows one to be present and this has a different effect than on-line meetings and reading books.

If given the opportunity, would you go again?

Ryan: Yes, and until then congregations can meet locally. This way people can learn more about the ecumenical movement.

Conclusion:

What I learned from Ryan is that the young adult population can be passionate about belonging to a church. The youth's engagement in social justice and environmentalism does ignite their commitment and connection to Christ's message of loving one's neighbour as oneself in action. Also, there are many bridges of ecumenism and one of them is worship, which Ryan felt was diverse and built community between various Christian faiths.

Interview with Johnians Fayaz and Shaylan

Two alumni of St John's College, Fayaz Hasan, and Shaylan Cottick recently announced their engagement. They graciously granted us an interview to share their experiences in the College, the residence and their relationship.

Why did you decide to join SJC?

Shaylan: Because I didn't get a room in a different residence for a second year at the last minute. I contacted SJC Residence with an urgent room request and luckily was offered a room.

Fayaz: Similar situation...I was living in a different residence back in 2012 but I had to look for a new residence because the first one became full. So, I came to St John's just on a trial basis, hoping to live there for four months and move back to my previous residence because I was expecting more space to become available. The residence assistant declined my request to move back because they do not allow students to move in the middle of the year. So, I ended up staying at St John's for three-and-half years.

What was your SJC residence experience?

Shaylan: I lived there for three years. I enjoyed it, I thought it was a good community. I met a lot of people many of whom became my friends. Some people I'm still in touch with today. I thought it was nice becoming part of a smaller community within the U of M campus, which is too large. Just being able to meet new people and getting involved with St John's was a great experience.

Fayaz: I also loved being a part of St John's as a student. Starting on moving day, within the first two, three days, you know half

of the residents and it's just because it's a tight community at St John's. It has a way of keeping everyone together, not just students, but also College staff as well. I felt like I had a good relationship with the College staff.

Course of study at U of M?

Fayaz: My bachelor's degree was in Labour Studies and Management

Shaylan: I did a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology when I was at St John's and then I went to Robson Hall afterwards for my law degree.

How did you two meet and when did you start dating?

Fayaz: How did we meet? We met in the residence. My room number was 128 and Shaylan's room was 136 and it was literally four doors away. And so we used to pass each other along the corridor and we would greet each other. Soon, we started hanging out and attended residence events together. This friendship evolved into a relationship. With time, when we got to know each other better, we started dating.

Shaylan: When did we start dating? I don't really remember the exact date, but it must have been about a year after we became friends we decided to start dating.

Fayaz: Our relationship reflects the inclusive culture of the College. My family are happy

about our relationship and have warmly welcomed Shaylan.

What do you make of the diversity in the College environment?

Shaylan: St John's College and the residence is a community of people with diverse backgrounds from all over the world who both live in residence or are just members of the College. So, it provides one with the opportunity to expand their horizons. It's an interesting place where everyone feels welcome, where you can just be yourself in a judgement-free environment.

Fayaz: As Shaylan said, the College environment is diverse and inclusive and provides the right environment to experience different cultures. That's one thing I appreciate about the College.

Why are you donating to the College?

Fayaz: I still very much feel connected to the College, and I feel like no matter how much time passes, I will always feel that

way. I said this before I left the college, that SJC will always be my home. And that I don't think is going to change any time soon. So why do I continue to donate or be a part of the college? Essentially, they go together. I donate to remain a part of the College, and I want nothing but the best things for the College, and this is my way of showing my appreciation for all the things that the college has done for me.

Shaylan: We had a great experience there as students, and even after we stopped living there, we remained involved, and now we get to be alumni and give back to support the College.

What do you think the College should be doing differently?

Shaylan: As to what could be done differently, I think the College could do more to market itself and its activities, because during my time there, I felt a lot of people didn't know about St John's. When I moved to the residence, no one I knew seemed to know it existed, and a lot of people didn't seem to know all the great benefits of becoming a member. And then once I told them I got many interested in becoming members, getting involved or going to events, applying for scholarships. So, I feel like the college has so much to offer, but maybe not as many people know about all the great benefits as they should.

Fayaz: I will make this comment more in my capacity as a former staff, rather than a student. I would say that the College should find a way to sort of push

on the marketing side of things as to what it is, which is a great place to be, a great place to be with lots of scholarships and bursaries that the College gives out on a yearly basis, a great residence, great people with diverse backgrounds. I feel it should be possible to sort of put the College in a better light in

front of the University, and not just stop there, but work on the outreach to support the College community grow externally.

The first post-COVID in-person Convocation was held last November. One hundred and thirty-eight College members who graduated from the University of Manitoba in 2022 with doctoral, master's and bachelor's degrees across various academic disciplines were honoured. Sixty-seven student members were awarded bursaries and scholarships totaling some \$180,000. Additionally, twenty-four prizes and awards were given to deserving student members for excellent performance in their courses of study. We are so proud of every one of our student members and wish them all the best in their future endeavors!

At the Convocation, three distinguished people were conferred with honorary awards. The Rt Hon Rev. Donald Phillips was

admitted to honorary fellowship of the College for his contributions to the community and the College. Mr. Geoffrey James and Mr. Arthur Kazumi Miki were conferred with honorary Doctor of Canon Law (*honoris causa*). Dr. Geoffrey James was recognized for his seminal photographic works on Canada. On his part, Dr. Arthur Miki received recognition for his leadership role in securing a national apology and reparations for Japanese Canadians for the mistreatment they suffered during World War II. Congratulations to the honorees!

11th Annual SJC Student Art Competition

The College recently held its 11th annual art competition. Fifteen entries were received. The Sunflower Detix (253) by Margot Morrish was adjudged first place while "Ceramic Dolls (023) by Anaies Mehrabian and "Sister Reflection" (694) tied for second.

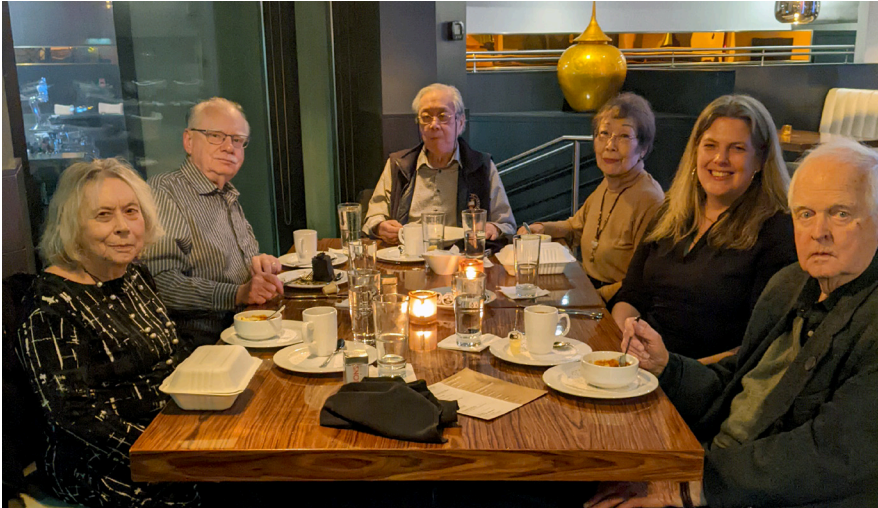
Community Connection
