4. New Business

- a) College Building Projects – The Warden updated Assembly on the progress of the College building projects. Meetings have continued with the University regarding the potential collaboration on a new residence. Meetings have also continued regarding the redevelopment of the third floor and our food services. Even if we move forward on a collaboration on the residence, we are still very interested in continuing with the third floor and food services redevelopment. The question that creates, is what specifically the residence portion will be and how does that potentially affect our food services expansion. In the short term, it is possible to make upgrades to our residence to keep it going for the next few years. If the collaboration doesn't happen, then those renovations are the first step in a bigger renovation of the residence. The food services expansion would potentially include a gallery space, meeting space, and a place designated around reconciliation.
- b) Results of Fellowship Survey – The Warden and Dean of Studies shared the results of the Fellowship Survey. Thank you to everyone who responded. Please see the attached spreadsheet for the data presented. A pub happy hour at the Daily Bread Café the last Friday of the month from 2:00 – 4:00 pm starting March 31. The Warden is also proposing a monthly lunch in the Daily Bread Café with smaller groups. This brought up a discussion of what the roles and responsibilities of the Fellows are as some of that information has been lost or needs to be renewed and changed and will be worked on by the Dean of Studies and the Warden with some clarity.
- c) Upcoming College Events – The Dean of Studies updated Assembly of upcoming events. Our last Soup and Bread will be on March 30 from 12 – 1pm. The Art and

Music Competition concludes this Friday, March 17, convening in the Chapel at 1 pm to hear the music finalists, following which we proceed to the Daily Bread Café for the adjudication of the art competition and reception. On March 16, the Casey Adams Art Exhibition opens in the Quiet Room. The end of term reception has yet to be set. The Marjorie Ward lecture will be on March 28 at 4:00 pm in room 118 and reception to follow in the Cross Common Room. J. 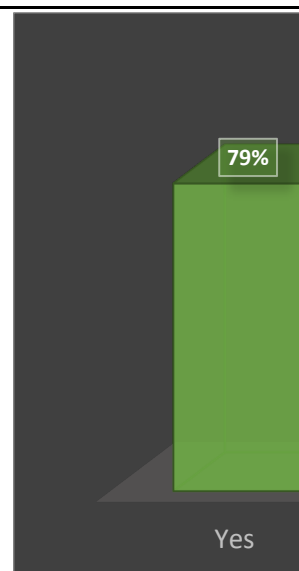

Would you like to see more social events at the College?

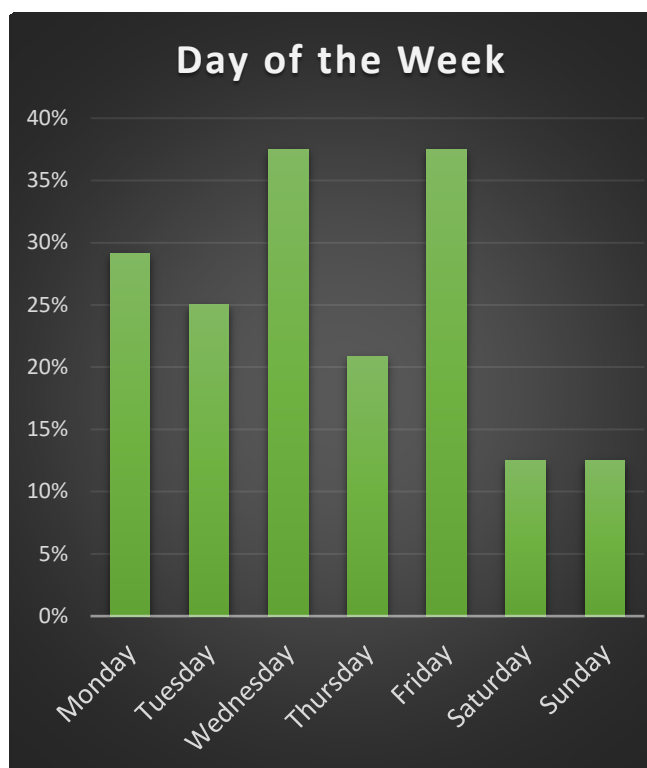

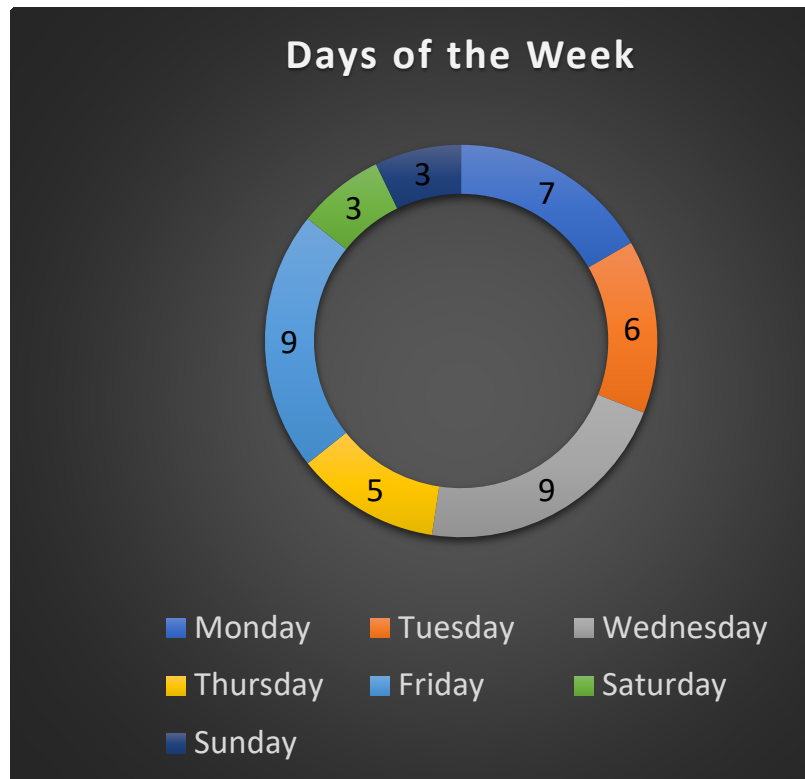

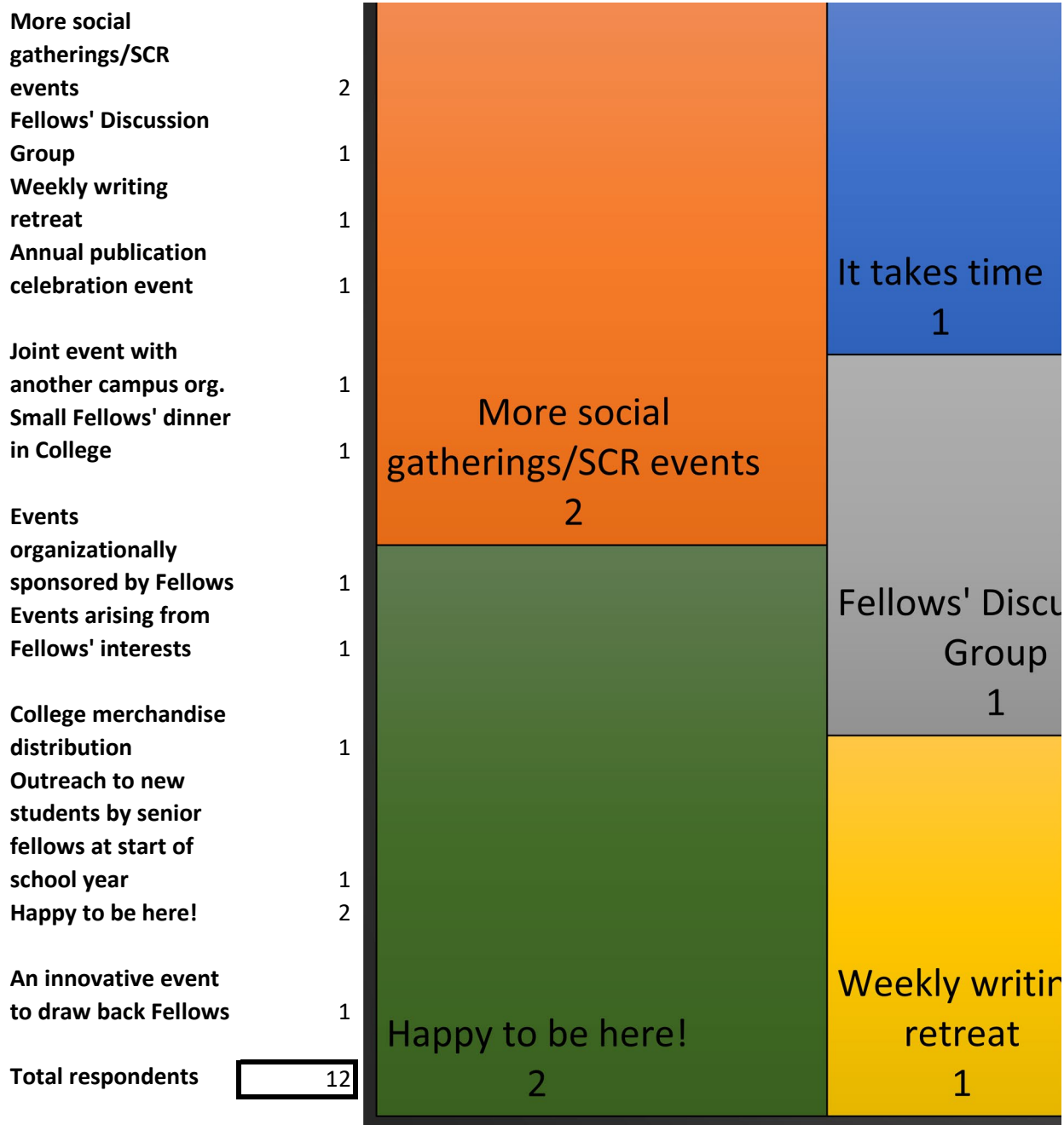

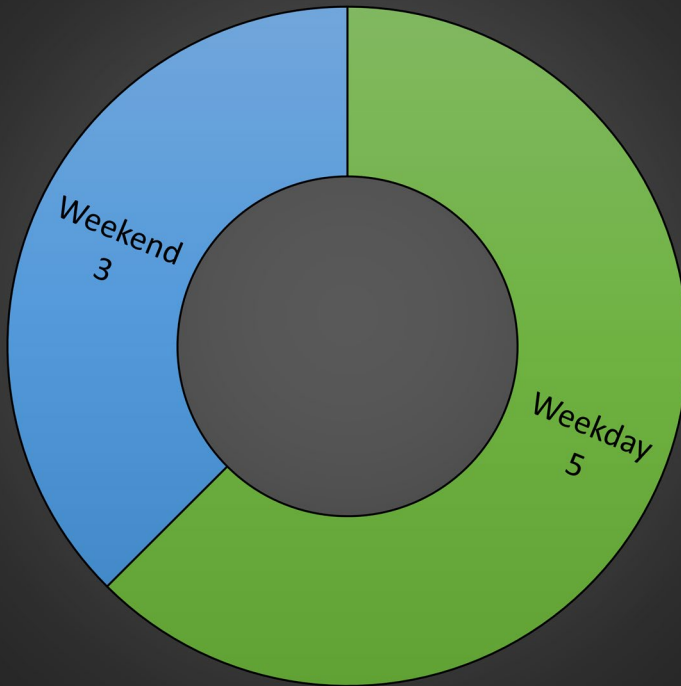


STAGES OF THOSE WHO SUBMITTED A SURVEY

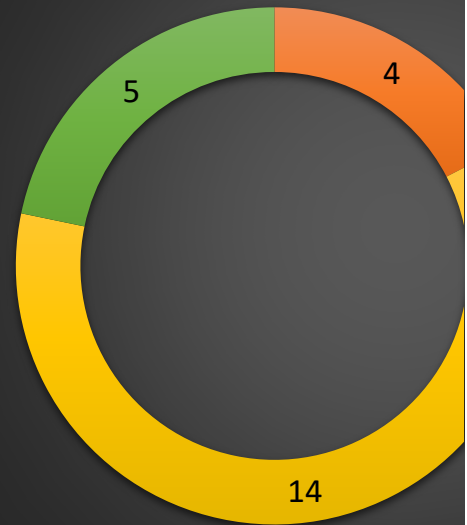


STAGES OF THOSE WHO GAVE SPECIFIC RESPONSES

Warden's Report to Assembly, March 2023

College Renewal/Capital Campaign

Per the motion passed by College Council in November, Administration has been developing plans and a fundraising strategy for the physical renewal of the College building. The original plan anticipated a renovation of the existing residence, along with a redevelopment of the third floor and an expansion of our food service areas. However, since the College was approached by the University about a potential collaboration on a residence project, it has necessarily led us down some new planning avenues. We have been meeting with representatives of the Office of the UM Vice-President (Administration), Architectural and Engineering Services, and Campus Planning about the overall project. The Development Officer and I also travelled to Ottawa and Toronto, and have been having several local meetings, to discuss the project with our alumni and donors and there continues to be great enthusiasm amid the various twists and turns.

Teaching/Scholarship

On Feb. 18, I served as a panel commentator at the Second World War Research Group – North America online conference, “Atrocity and Excess.” Since Assembly last met, I have also completed a book manuscript review for Yale University Press, and a book review for the *English Historical Review*. On March 7, I participated in the dissertation defense for one of my former students at the University of Southern Mississippi. The course I am teaching for the History Department, “History of Britain from 1485,” continues.

Highlights of Other Recent Activities

- On Feb. 11, I participated in the SJCSA retreat run by our Chaplain at the Leaf.
- On Feb. 13, I served as a judge for the finals of the National Public Speaking Competition at St. John's Ravenscourt.
- On Feb. 28, I attended and offered the first reading at a renewal of ordination vows service for Anglican clergy at St John's Cathedral.
- On March 1, the Chancellor, Chaplain, and I met with the Lutheran Bishop and on-campus spiritual care adviser about future collaborations.
- On March 2, I was a judge for the UM Graduate School's 3 Minute Thesis competition.
- As part of the University's ongoing strategic planning process, I served as a facilitator for two consultation sessions and attended three, including a consultation session held at SJC.
- On March 11, I attended the “Super Convocation” – two belated UM graduation ceremonies for students who missed their in-person convocations during 2020 and 2021.
- I am serving on the committee planning our Art and Music Competitions, which will close with performances and a reception on March 17.
- I attended a number of our regular events around the College, including Soup & Bread.
- I continue to serve on the Advisory Circle for the Emmanuel Mission Learning Centre at Holy Trinity Church.

- I continue to represent the College at meetings of Dean's Council, Provost's Council, University Senate, Faculty of Arts Council, and Diocesan Council.

Additionally, we have collaborated with the Music Faculty this year and there will be performances in the SJC chapel by the finalists in their competition. The event will commence at 1pm in the chapel and after the musical performances, we will convene in the Daily Bread for the art adjudication and the reception. It promises to be a great event and we hope to continue this collaboration with the Music Faculty next year.

KC Adams Art Exhibition

Fellow Survey Results

As you know, we sent out a survey to the fellows a few weeks ago to get a sense of how we might better serve the fellowship. We also want to revitalize the social and academic life at the college in the wake of the pandemic. The results suggest that fellows are interested in both social (about 80%) and academic events (about 67%). The warden and I have discussed several options moving forward and we would like to implement a 'pilot project' of sorts as the term comes to an end in order to try out some new initiatives in both areas. We have tentatively scheduled an informal 'pub happy hour' on the last Friday of the month (during the academic year) so the first one will take place in the Daily Bread on Friday March 31 from 2-4pm. Feel free to drop by for a chat and a pint (or a coffee). Additionally, there was great enthusiasm for events such as Marjorie Ward and Soup and Bread, which is encouraging. Our numbers at Soup and Bread this year have not been particularly strong, but I realize this year is our 'return from covid' year and I hope that we will see higher attendance rates in the near future.

We are also hoping to initiate more events that bring fellows and students together at the college. We have discussed a writing retreat with both fellows and grad students as well as a joint symposium where we have one student present and one fellow present. We will keep you posted as more details on those events become available.

Fellowship Roles and Responsibilities

SJC has a fellow's handbook but most of us have never seen this document and the warden and dean of studies are aware that the roles and responsibilities of the fellows are not always clear. Since we have had a number of new fellows join us within the last 2-3 years, we have decided to re-visit this issue and prepare an on-boarding document of sorts for all fellows in order to clarify some of the obligations that come with fellowship at SJC. We recognize the fellows already have many responsibilities within their respective faculties but we also want to create a space at the college where fellows want to participate in college events. The sense of community at the college is one of our strengths and we understand that the pandemic has certainly changed the nature of our interactions over the last few years. We want to take this opportunity to generate enthusiasm and interest in college events and this depends on the participation and attendance of our fellows. Bursars' report to Assembly March 13th, 2023

College Operations

After the departure of the Ukrainian refugees our Residence occupancy level remains around 40%. However, we have already received a number of inquiries from external groups wanting to book blocks of rooms during the summer including a number of returning groups that have reconstituted their programs following their hiatus during the COVID shutdown. This is very encouraging and bodes well for our summer numbers.

Catering and Daily Bread Café sales have remained strong, with 3rd quarter catering revenues well ahead of our numbers from 2019, and DBC sales on par:

Budgeting/Audit

The Assistant Bursar and I met with one of our auditors from BDO Canada in February for some preliminary discussions to plan for our upcoming audit in the spring. This was a good opportunity for Beatriz to meet one of the auditors, and discuss the general nature, scope, and process of the audit.

The Finance & Administration Committee has approved a motion that recommends Council approve the budget parameters for the 2023-24 Operating Budget, which will then be reviewed in full by Finance & Admin, and subsequently presented to Assembly for approval at its May meeting.

Residence Project

The Warden and I had a second meeting with the Associate VP Admin and the CFO of the University in early March. Some points of interest from that meeting:

- The University hopes to have business plan proposal for its construction ready to present to the Province by the summer.
- The University remains open to conversations about locating the Residence on the College campus.
- The University is open to developing a MOU with the College that would act as a placeholder to firm up our partnership while the more detailed aspects of any agreement could be carefully considered.
- The University recognizes our need to have a significant stake in the project to solidify our position as a partner.
- The University reiterated their desire for us to provide an enhanced student experience for students.
- The University recognizes there is a lot to think about and that this relationship and potential partnership is complicated and requires proper care and consideration.

Dean of Residence Report – March 2023

Residence Projects

I am currently working with the Bursar on initial plans around renovations to the basement common rooms (TV Lounge, Games Room, and Study Room) which will hopefully include fresh paint, new furniture, improved lighting, and replacement of existing TVs with up-to-date 4K TVs (potentially with the addition of a video game console). I am also evaluating the current use of the Dons'/Housekeeping offices and considering the future of this shared space with the potential of moving the Dons' office to its own quarters.

I updated the Residence brochure for the recent February U of M Open House and have included QR codes to critical website areas (residence fees, application form, etc.) allowing these brochures to be professionally printed in the near future while remaining accurate from year-to-year.

Winter Session

As of March 8, we have 41 residents in the residence, including three PhD students from Earth Sciences who are boarding with us on a short-term basis.

Summer Session

The Summer session is already shaping up to be quite busy, especially during July and August. I have had significant interest from a number of groups who have previously made use of the residence during the Summer months and expect at several points over the Summer to be at or near capacity. I have likewise had significant interest from students studying at the University on a short-term basis over the Summer. It appears that the University is only accepting students who are staying on into the Fall term, creating significant opportunities from St John's to attract international students (from initiatives such as MITACS internships and the EU Erasmus+ Mobility Program) who might in other years have boarded directly with the University.

Residence Activity

I hosted a Valentine's Banquet on February 17 on behalf of the Residence Council Co-President, who was unable to attend. Student engagement with events has remained tenuous and I have made the decision to cease attempts to convene a full Residence Council for this year. I am presently considering ways to reinvigorate the Council for the Fall session and hope to assemble a group mid-Summer to put together plans for Orientation Week.

Don Applications are open until March 17 with interviews to follow in early April. I have had limited interest from people who are not presently Dons and am in the process of actively soliciting applications from current residents who seem like they might be a good fit.

- Applied to Canada Summer jobs for a grant for the 2022 summer student. Likely will find out in May if we have been successful.

Capital Campaign

- The direction of the campaign is changing and until we have a more definite plan then my meetings with the consultant, Kat Kupca are occasional.
- Continue to meet and talk to potential donors about the projects.

Other

- At the invitation of the Bishop I was on the Task Force for Common Ministry and Mission. We had been asked to address the issue of Parish contributions to the Diocese. A report was submitted to their Council and referred to Executive.
