RECTOR'S MESSAGE

As Rector of St. Paul's College, I am pleased to present our Annual Report for the 2021-2022 academic year. Two years ago, we joined with all of Manitoba's other post-secondary institutions in closing our offices and classrooms. The following year we were again saddened to conclude a second academic year without celebrating in-person those of our students who were graduating. We also missed seeing our incoming first year students in our hallways at the start of both the 2020-21 and 2021-22 academic years. We look forward to having our students back in-person for the 2022-23 academic year, which commences this September.

Despite the challenges the past two years threw our way, our students, faculty and staff showed both resilience and courage, with 190 completing their online studies, thereby graduating in the spring and fall of 2021.

Over the past two years we reached out to our students and faculty on a regular basis. We supported them with health-related information, preventative measures while on campus, and in providing bursaries for those in financial need. We look forward to having our students back in our classrooms, cafeteria, library, chapel, and study areas. In the meantime, we continue to raise funds for student emergency bursaries through our St. Paul's College Foundation, with donors using the CanadaHelps.Org website. We thank all our donors who helped us get through the two past years, which was a challenge!

This report provides an overview of our most recent year here at the College. Here are some highlights worth noting:

- In 2021-22, 762 University of Manitoba students joined St. Paul's College, a decline from 843 in 2020-21. We expect to reverse this decline this year and into the next.
- With 190 student members graduating in the past year with their university degrees, this is an increase from 171 in the previous year. To celebrate, we held our Baccalaureate Celebrations on June 3rd and 5th.
- Our student members were enrolled in a wide range of University of Manitoba degree programs. This includes 25% in the Sciences, 22% in the Arts and Humanities, and 12% in Business. Many other students were enrolled in University One, Law, Medicine and Health Sciences, Engineering, Music, Education, and Peace and Conflict Studies.
- Our Catholic Studies BA minor program continues to be the largest of its kind in Canada. A total of 403 University of Manitoba students enrolled in courses provided by the Jesuit Centre for Catholic Studies. We thank the University of Manitoba for their continued support for this program through the 10-Year Jesuit Academic Funding Agreement.
- The Joint MA with the University of Winnipeg and PhD program in Peace and Conflict Studies are thriving programs housed in the Arthur V. Mauro Centre for Peace and Justice. A majority of these students come from all parts of the world. Over \$100,000 in awards were provided to these

students through the St. Paul's College Foundation Inc.


- Our faculty members continue to be drawn from a wide range of University of Manitoba departments, including 21 faculty, in addition to associate members, research fellows and visiting scholars.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

STUDENT MEMBERSHIP

- A total of 762 University of Manitoba students registered as members of St. Paul's College as recorded November 1, 2021.
- In 2021, 190 student members of St. Paul's College graduated from the University of Manitoba. 44 students graduated at the Fall Convocation and 146 students graduated at the Spring Convocation.
- In 2021, 569 of the eligible 683 student members, or 83.3% of students returning to the University of Manitoba in the 2021-22 academic year continued as College members.
- In the 2021-2022 regular academic year, the majority of St. Paul's College students were enrolled in Science (25%), Arts (22%) and Business (12%).

COURSE OFFERINGS

- In the 2021-22 regular academic year due to the Covid shut down and resulting move to online course delivery by the University of Manitoba and St. Paul's College there were no classes taught in St. Paul's College; however 60 online courses were taught by College faculty members.

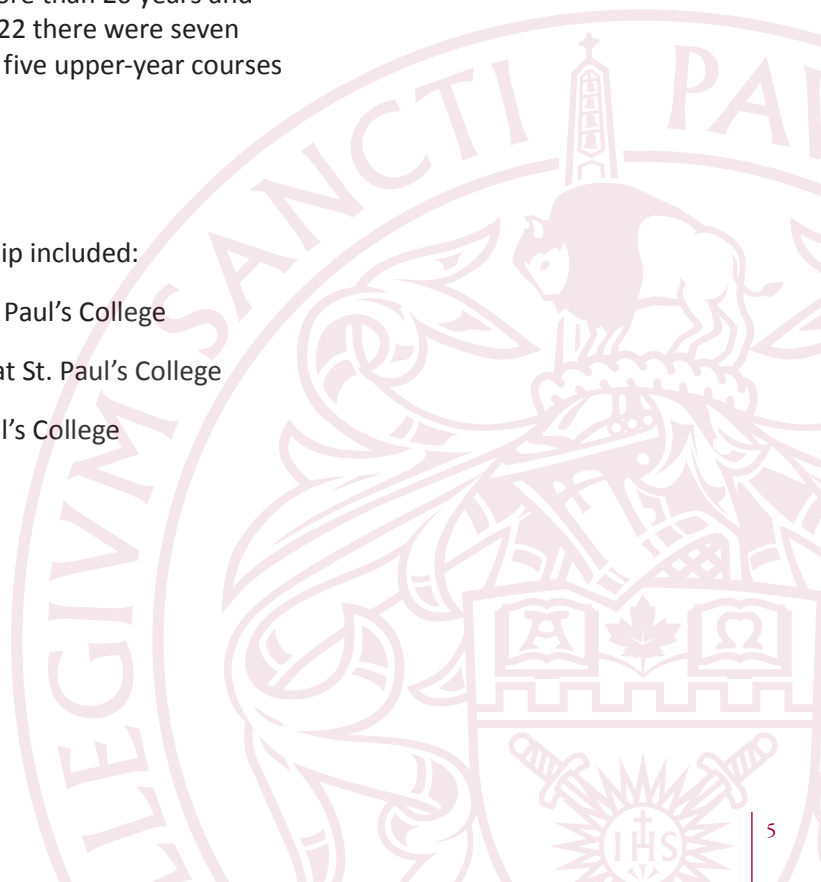
AREA OF EMPHASIS

- In the 2021-22 academic year, SPC offered a Catholic Studies program and a PhD program in Peace and Conflict Studies.
- The PhD Program in Peace and Conflict Studies is now in its thirteenth year of implementation. In 2021-22, there were 8 graduate course sections of Peace and Conflict Studies.
- The BA (Minor) in Catholic Studies has existed for more than 20 years and is the largest program of its kind in Canada. In 2021-22 there were seven sections of CATH 1190 (including summer 2021) and five upper-year courses offered. Total enrollment was 403 students.

FACULTY MEMBERSHIP

As of February 2022 St. Paul's College faculty membership included:

- 21 individuals hold regular membership status at St. Paul's College
- Eight individuals hold associate membership status at St. Paul's College
- Ten individuals hold research fellow status at St. Paul's College
- Seven senior scholars
- Ten honorary members
- Six visiting scholars

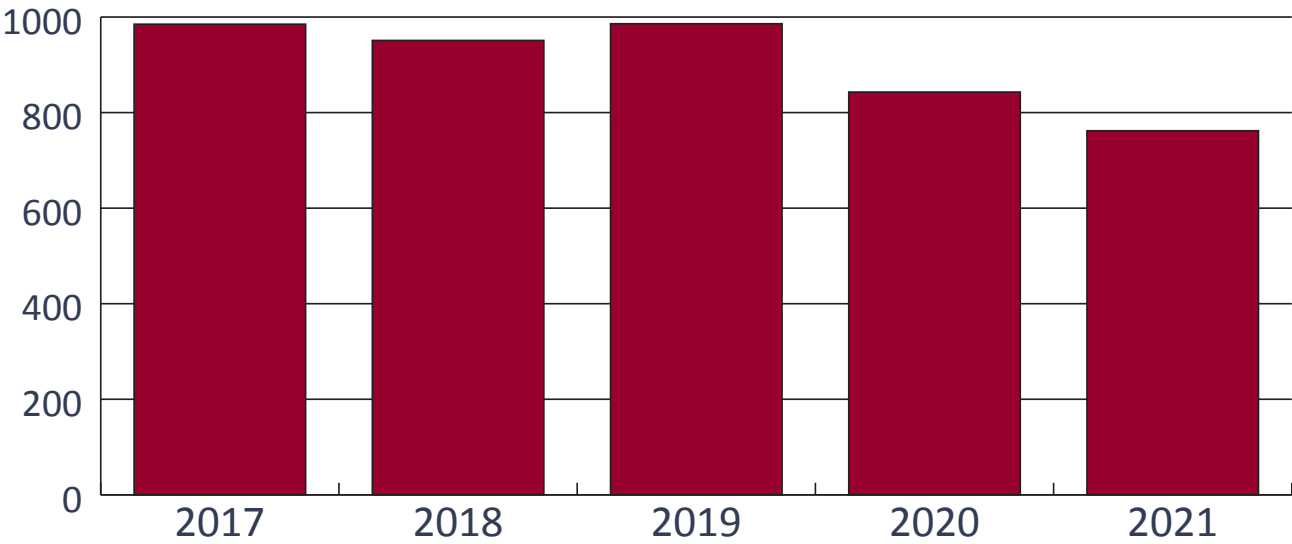
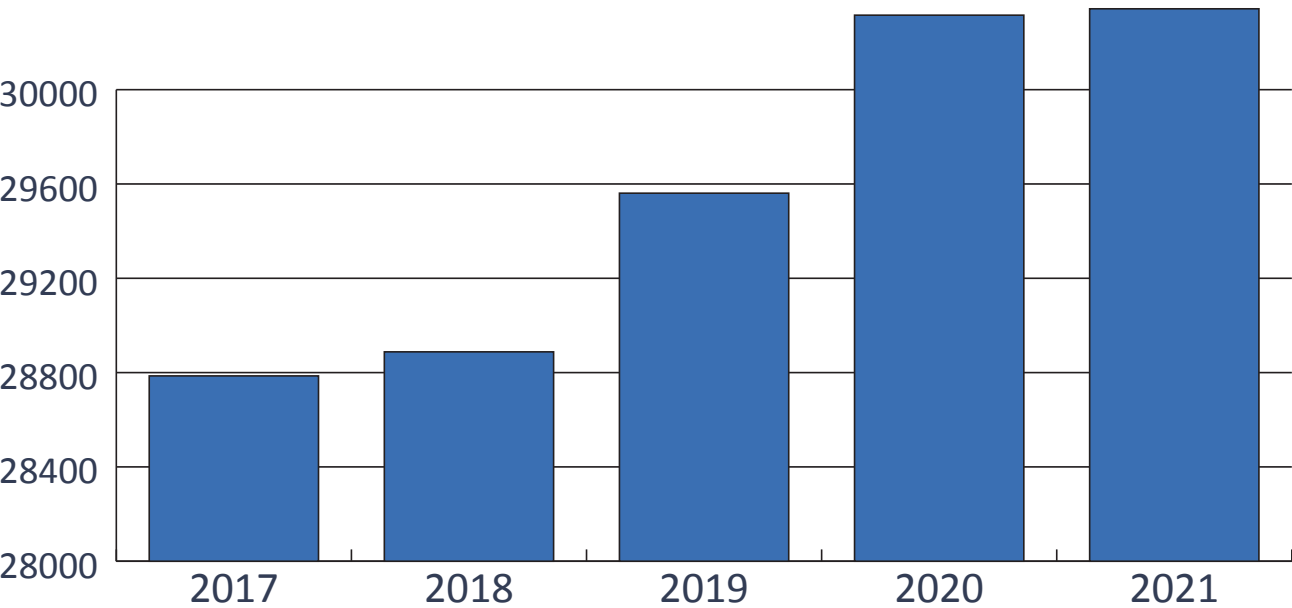


CHART 2: UNIVERSITY OF MANITOBA ENROLMENT (2017–2021 | AT NOVEMBER 1, 2021)

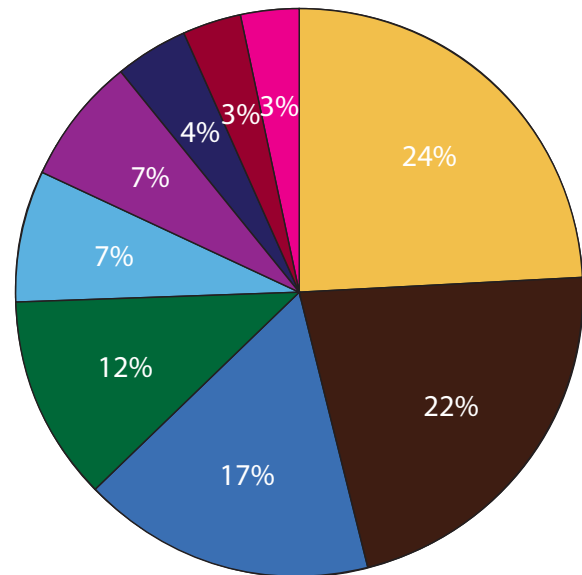

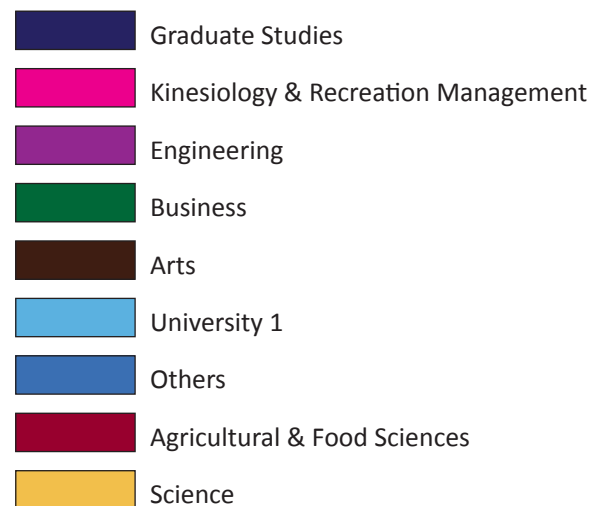

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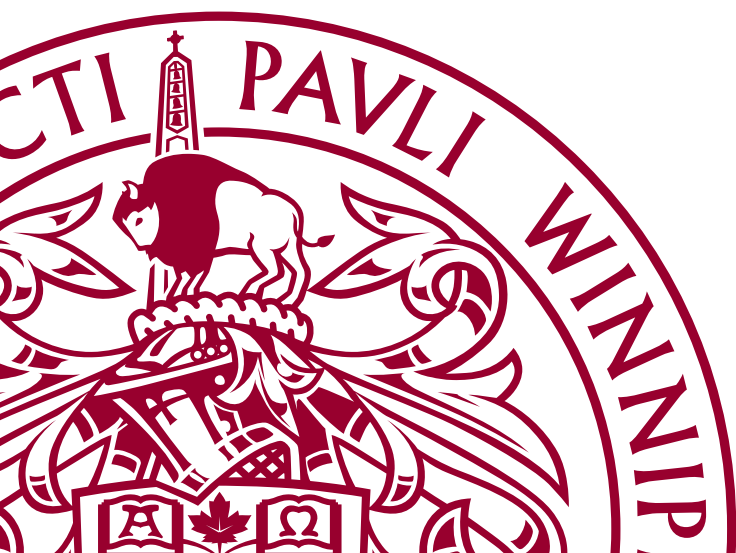

Support Staff: the Assembly Constitution states that one representative from the Support Staff shall be a member of the Assembly as selected by the Support staff.

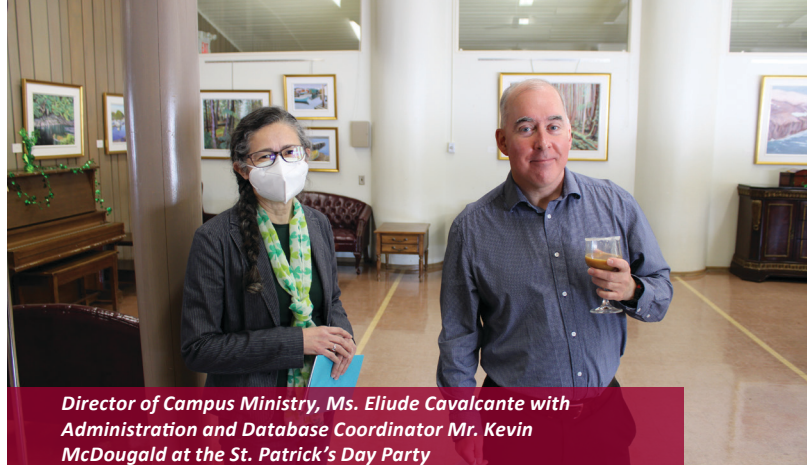

Honourary Member: one whom the Assembly wishes to recognize as a distinguished contributor to the church, country or to the College and University life in general, but who receives no emoluments and has no share in College governance as a result of Honourary membership.

Visiting Member: one who is engaged in teaching and/or research, and who holds a temporary or part-time appointment at St. Paul's College and/or the University, or who is nominated to membership in the Assembly for reasons deemed appropriate by the Assembly.

The Belltower Café is a 180-seat cafeteria located in the lower level of St. Paul's College that has been serving students, faculty, and staff of St. Paul's College and the University of Manitoba for several decades.

The Café features daily house-made specials, as well as an extensive menu of breakfast and lunch items. They serve the University's best burgers with lots of fries to go with them.

Since the fall of 2020, the Mauro Institute for Peace & Justice has broadcast and archived online lectures and events, including: 12 Brown Bag Lectures; the 2022 MLT Aikins St. Paul's College University Affiliation Lecture; and a Dialogue with a Nobel Laureate, Dr. Muhammad Yunus. All these lectures and events can be viewed on the Mauro Institute YouTube channel.

Most of the online Brown Bag Lectures feature alumni of the Peace and Conflict Studies PhD or JMP programs. Mauro Director, Dr. Charlotte Enns served as online lecture host, with some spot hosting duties by PACS Graduate Programs Director Dr. Adam Muller and technical support from Mauro Manager Jason Brennan.

The MLT Aikins St. Paul's College University Affiliation Lecture returned in March of 2022. Dr. Heather Eaton, Full Professor, Saint Paul University, Ottawa delivered the online lecture, "Spirituality and Wonder: A Way Forward in Hard Times" in conjunction with the Prairie Symposium for the Common Good, an inaugural, annual event co-hosted by the Jesuit Centre for Catholic Studies (St. Paul's College - University of Manitoba), Campion College

(University of Regina), and St. Thomas More College (University of Saskatchewan).

Dr. Eaton's lecture identified and offered a diverse perspective on the ecological decline occurring around the world. Analyses were offered on the political, economic, justice, structural, gender, and conflict aspects of ecological challenges. The presentation focused on the relationships among the common good, justice, peace, and sustainability, including an awareness of planetary as well as human solidarity and touched upon themes of spirituality, ethics, and aesthetics, and wonder.

The Winnipeg International Storytelling Festival is planning for a full, in-person post-pandemic English and French festival in the spring of 2023. In 2021 and 2022, the French festival, lead by Janine Tougas, delivered online programming for schools and the public. The French festivals were produced in partnership with the provincial government's Bureau de l'éducation française and jointly funded by the federal and provincial French Second Language Revitalization Program. A return to an in-person festival in English and French in 2023 is highly anticipated.

Another challenging year under the Covid-19 pandemic has come to a close. As such this past year continued to pose many challenges, especially in reaching out to new students since classes continued to be offered online and students continued to attend classes from home. However, the Campus Ministry (CM) team worked diligently to adapt to the ever-changing rules and conditions imposed by the health measures to provide activities and a safe space to worship for students and the larger Campus community.

Campus Ministry continues also to take every opportunity to reach out to students, for example by participating in University of Manitoba online orientation on August 31, 2021, and in other virtual/ hybrid/in person activities which CM had been invited to participate in such as “Riding the Waves: Reflecting on Two Years of Pandemic Living,” on Wednesday, March 23, 2022.

As pandemic restrictions allowed, in October at the beginning of this academic year, the CM team in collaboration with Oliver Capko, SJ offered a day hike retreat though Birds Hill Park. The goal of this retreat was to give students the opportunity to meet and connect with other students and the CM team, to experience God’s power and transcendence and to connect with God through nature. It was a beautiful day to be outdoors, and participants enjoyed the opportunity to pray, reflect and share a little bit about themselves.

Masses continued to be celebrated in Christ the King Chapel throughout this academic year on Wednesdays at 11:45am and on Sundays at 11:00am, as well as Eucharistic Adoration on the first Friday of each month, observing the most current health rules. All Liturgies continued to be livestreamed on the St Paul’s College Facebook page and also uploaded to the SPC YouTube social media channel. Notably even now after the lifting of most of the restrictions, attendance in person to Liturgies and activities have not yet returned to pre-pandemic numbers.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation continued to be available

by appointment not only to students but also to staff of the University and members of the community.

The Campus Ministry team continued to be available by appointment to meet virtually, over the phone or upon request in person with students for spiritual direction, counseling, or guidance. Ongoing communication with students and members of our Sunday community continued to be done via mail, email, phone, Zoom and curb side visits.

Inspiring reflections written by Fr. Colin continued to be posted this past year on a regular basis on the Campus Ministry/SPC website, and to which many have sent messages of appreciation as the reflections have helped them to cope with the challenges imposed by the new reality of the pandemic.

This past year there were two baptisms in Christ the King Chapel: one on October 2nd and the other on December 11. No weddings were celebrated this year in Christ the King Chapel.

Michael Resendes has left his position as Campus Ministry Assistant as of December 31st to take on the position of Campus Ministry Coordinator at St Boniface Diocesan High School. On February 28 Myles Cesario, an alumnus of St Paul’s High School, first-year student in philosophy at the University of Manitoba, was hired as the new Campus Ministry Assistant.

On December 31, Fr Colin had an emergency surgery and was on health leave for a few weeks. Fr Richard Arsenault and on one Sunday Msgr. Ward Jamieson were able to come and celebrate Sunday Mass during Fr Colin’s time of recovery. CM and our Sunday community is thankful to Fr Richard Arsenault and Msgr. Ward Jamieson for their support.

We are grateful for the continuing support of Oliver Capko, SJ to Campus Ministry activities, as well as for the support of Sr. Jo-Ann Duggan, s.g.m. and Sr. Cathy Laviolette, s.n.j.m. for making themselves available to journey with students as needed. We are also grateful to the faithful student, alumni and community members who have made our liturgies and activities so joyful.

JESUIT CENTRE FOR CATHOLIC STUDIES

The Jesuit Centre for Catholic Studies is a teaching and research centre operated out of St. Paul's College and the Faculty of Arts, University of Manitoba. It operates the largest Catholic Studies program in Canada and teaches roughly 400 students annually in a variety of courses designed to promote a scholarly understanding of the Catholic Church. It is staffed by two full-time professors and several sessional lecturers. Its faculty conduct research in a number of fields related to the culture and history of Catholicism, the Society of Jesus, and contemporary religious issues. It prides itself on its academic rigour, its student-focus, and its close connection to the community in Manitoba. The centre services students from 20 Faculties, Colleges or Schools at the University of Manitoba. Catholic Studies graduates are currently pursuing careers in Law, Nursing, Medicine, Journalism, and Education, among other pursuits.

The 2021-22 academic year continued to provide challenges to the work of the Jesuit Centre as a result of the pandemic and a faculty strike in the fall. The work of the centre continued, however, and the Catholic Studies program offered a range of courses and events this year. Enrollment remained steady and high for our Catholic Studies courses. As well, in Fall 2021 we offered CATH 2000, "Catholicism on Film" for the first time. This course was taught by a new sessional, Dr. Tim Penner, and the course will be added permanently to the slate of Catholic

Studies Courses this summer. Student satisfaction remains high in Catholic Studies courses.

In terms of events, the Jesuit Centre had a very busy year. One of our students was among only 100 students from North and South America selected to participate in the "Building Bridges: North and South" event hosted by Loyola University Chicago, which included a live (Zoom) audience with Pope Francis as part of the Universal Synod of the Church. We also hosted talks on medieval Roman catacombs and Scottish witchcraft in the fall semester and in the winter we had talks on restorative justice and the Jesuit Bollandist society. The highlight of Jesuit Centre events this year was the Prairie Symposium for the Common Good, which took place on March 24-25, 2022. The symposium was a collaboration between our College and Campion and St. Thomas More Colleges. This event featured 3 keynote lectures and two days of papers offered by faculty and experts from across Canada. The symposium attracted 250 registrants for the online event, and will be continued at Campion and Thomas More in the coming years.

In all, 2021-22 was a productive year. Dr. Bacola and Dr. MacLeod published peer reviewed research, students grew and learned in Catholic Studies classes, and the Jesuit Centre sponsored lectures and events of great interest to the university and larger community. We all look forward to a return to in-person classes in 2022-23.

I was ambitious to study archaeology and art history of Iran and beyond, graduating from the University of Tehran with a Ph.D. in the prehistoric archaeology of Iran. Afterward, I continued my archaeological dreams by working as an academic, lecturing courses, researching, writing and translating some books and papers.

After several years, I realized that I required a more adventurous time for learning and opening new horizons in looking at the world of archaeological thinking. Particularly, I was looking for opportunities to pursue my readings on the more scientific side of the field. I also wanted to know more about the prehistoric cultures of the Levant, namely Biblical lands, accessing which was politically and systematically impossible in my home country.

Now that I am working in the NEBAL (Near Eastern and Biblical Archaeology Laboratory) under the supervision of Distinguished Professor Haskell Greenfield, I can say that I achieved what I was looking for. During my time at St. Paul’s College, I experienced some wonderful moments of thinking, doing and learning, enjoying its calm and supportive environment that allows everyone to grow and flourish.”

NEAR EASTERN AND BIBLICAL ARCHAEOLOGY LABORATORY

Dr. Haskel Greenfield, *Co-Director*

As with last year, Covid-19 restrictions put a severe damper on most activities associated with NEBAL (the Near Eastern and Biblical Archaeology Lab). In spite of the shut-down and limited access to NEBAL, we have had a very busy year for both staff and graduate students of NEBAL. In general, teaching continued via zoom for all classes until the Winter 2022 term. Then, we were able to hold a reading and research class in NEBAL once again. It was an intensive graduate level course in zooarchaeology.

Unfortunately, due to Covid-19 restrictions, undergraduates were not able to work in NEBAL at all this year. However, several undergraduates continued to work from home on various projects associated with NEBAL.

As restrictions eased up, more and more graduate students were able to come in and access the resources in the lab. Covid-19 safety protocols were put in place to minimize the chance of anyone getting sick. During this year, three graduate students actively worked in NEBAL on their thesis research. PhD student Mahyar KhademiBami is studying the spatial organization of Early Bronze Age households using material from the site of Titriş Höyük, Turkey. We welcomed a new PhD student, Vahid Askarpour and his family to the city. In addition, we hosted a former MA student of ours (Eleuterio “Luther” Sousa), who is now a PhD student at Macquarie University (Australia). He has been stuck here for the past two years since he could not travel (until now) to Australia. He has been a fixture in the lab now for several years. Currently, he is in the USA receiving advanced training in dental isotope analysis as part of his thesis training.

We completed the analysis of the animal bones from the German Archaeological Institute’s in Jerusalem excavations on Mt. Zion in Jerusalem. We are now preparing a publication on it with the excavators. We continued to analyse the animal bones from the Late Bronze Age palace and Iron Age temple from Tel Beth Shemesh in central Israel excavated by Tel Aviv University. Research also continued on the analysis of other materials from Israel, Egypt, Turkey and Iraq that are curated in the lab. While last year was used to write up lots of old studies for publications, lab work has become more important this year.

Co-Director Haskel J. Greenfield was in Boston at the ASOR 2021 conference where he and several students presented the results of their work in Egypt, Israel, and Jordan. In addition, he was able to publish several journal articles and book chapters (lead author or co-author on six refereed journal publications, lead author or co-author on ten refereed book chapters, lead author on three non-refereed publications). A book coauthored with

Eleuterio Sousa is also about to be submitted for publication. He was successful in obtaining several new grants to be able to fund students and research in NEBAL. He also made two YouTube videos based on his research programs in Serbia and Bosnia (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=hKTO-Hz8qWI&t=23s>; <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=R9oQFgcWKYA&t=35s>).

Co-director Tina L. Greenfield has also used the time to publish 7 journal articles and 2 book chapters based on her research programs associated with NEBAL. During the summer of 2021, she participated in the sARP (shishálh Archaeological Research Project) on the Sunshine Coast of British Columbia where she is part of the senior staff and the project zooarchaeologist. In February, she presented remotely as a guest speaker for the universities of Connecticut and Stonybrook joint Graduate School virtual speaker series on The Mesopotamian Hinterland: traces of food production in the landscape as part of her larger research on food management strategies in ancient Iraq. She was also awarded a grant Con-SUMER sites: food provisioning and economic resilience in ancient Mesopotamia STM Research Grant \$4,996.31. Grant #2278-0022 to study the isotopes from animal teeth from sites in southern Iraq.

Tina and Haskel successfully competed to obtain a new 5 year grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC 435-2021-0180) for \$393,960 CDN (Provisioning early complex society in the southern Levant: domestic livestock production, management (mobility, feeding and watering), and transport during the Early Bronze Age. Haskel J. Greenfield (PI), Tina L. Greenfield (Co-PI), Elizabeth Arnold, Gideon Hartman, and John Wilkins (collaborators). Funded April 5, 2021 for 5 years.

Additionally, they were awarded for the second time, funding from the Canadian Light Source (CLS) Synchrotron (BMIT-ID) for their research on Ancient urban economies: dental cementum analysis of zooarchaeological specimens from the Near East., X-ray Imaging and Microtomography. The Fr. Harold Drake, SJ Library reopened its doors on March 28, 2022 after nearly two years of full pandemic closure. In the meantime, there has been much reorganization within the larger library system. Brenda-Lee Kahler and Barbara Unger returned as frontline library assistants. Justin Fuhr, our Liaison Librarian for Catholic Studies, PACS, and NEBAL, is moving to a position in the Science Library. We bid him a fond farewell.

Brenda-Lee and Barbara spent 2021 alternating working from home with staffing a COVID-safe study site on the first floor of Elizabeth Dafoe Library. During that time, Libraries consolidated a new program of staff training and development that will continue to be effectively carried out (at present, remotely.) During this time, Libraries continued to serve

students and faculty by providing access to collections via online services like Hathi Trust and chapter scanning. As physical borrowing returned, it began via curbside pickup. Eventually, pickup lockers were made available. Online Reference services continued throughout. Connection with St. Paul's College was maintained by various means. College events, committee, and staff meetings were made available via Zoom and other online tools. Of course, members of the College could still contact library staff via email and phone. St Paul's College is an affiliated College operating within the larger context of the University of Manitoba. As part of the University, the college receives budgetary funds which support College operations.

The College is also a non-profit organization, incorporated under the laws of Manitoba, with registered charity status.

Given the College's dual role, the Comptroller's office also holds a dual financial role and is responsible to both the College and University.

For the College, the Comptroller's office is responsible for the operation of the Accounting and Finance unit, which supports the Rector, Dean, college units, and Board of Governors.

The activities are Budgetary & Financial reporting, Academic Awards financial cycle, Payroll & Pension System, Receivables & Payables, Treasury Services, and charity reporting (PST & GST) to the Provincial and Federal regulatory bodies.

During the 2020 – 2021 year, the Accounting and Finance unit received and deposited \$895,446 in revenues and expended \$854,514 (issuing over 1,500 academic award and vendor cheques).

A LOOK AT THE PAST, AND ONGOING IMPROVEMENTS TO THE COLLEGE DURING 2021-2022

This will be my last report to you as by the time this has gone to print I will have retired from the University of Manitoba and St. Paul's College. Over the last 10 years my goal has been to greatly improve the quality, usability, safety and aesthetics of the St. Paul's College built environment. During this time, we have undertaken significant classroom upgrades, development of the Near Eastern and Biblical Archaeology Laboratory, replacement of all the windows in the College, many improvements to the chapel, cafeteria renewal, roof repair and replacements in both the chapel and College, lighting replacement throughout the College and many upgrades to the external environment. We have accomplished much, but there is more work to be done.

This past year our goal of continuous improvements to St. Paul's College was again constrained by shut-downs and business interruptions due to the COVID-19 virus. Nevertheless we were able to make small advancements in further enhancing the cafeteria, classrooms, offices, research and study areas, building comfort and aesthetics of the College.

- We are continuing to plan for, and negotiate with, a highly experienced group to finance, build and operate a 300 bed student residence project on St. Paul's College land under a long term lease agreement.
- The student association coordinated and funded to have the cafeteria walls painted.
- Emergency lighting in the NEBAL facility was installed.
- Various minor improvements were made to the faculty lounge, chapel and chapel artifacts with further work planned for the summer of 2022.
- Initial planning for a renovation to the staff lounge and kitchen in the Kelly Wing is underway with work to be completed in the summer of 2022.
- Some asbestos abatement and mold abatement was completed.
- Improved emergency lighting in the College will be installed in the summer of 2022.
- The roofs above the Kelly Administrative Wing and the classroom wing will be entirely replaced in the summer of 2022.

These projects were accomplished with the financial support of our student members, St. Paul's College Students' Association, St. Paul's College, St. Paul's College Foundation Inc., the University of Manitoba, SPC Alumni and Friends and other donors.
